**Resolution.**

Petition of property owners to establish a curb line on Fourth Street between America Ave. and Park Ave. was read, accepted and ordered filed.  
Petition of property owners in East Bemidji for street lighting was read and referred to the light committee.

**Miscellaneous.**  
Report of the committee to ascertain the fair and reasonable value of

the village hall property of the village of Nymore, including fire apparatus, jail, etc., land 75 by 140 feet, centrally located, placing said value at \$1,500.00, was read and on motion declared accepted and filed.  
Bond of the Illinois Steel Bridge Co. in sum of \$22,750.00 with the American Fidelity Co., Montpelier, Vermont, as surety was approved.  
Cigarette license of J. E. Maloy was granted.  
City engineer was directed to furnish plat of proposed additional 30 feet for street purposes along north line of 15th street from Doud Ave. to Irvine Ave.

Mr. Dickinson was granted use of one-third of Minn. Ave. abutting lot on block 21. O. T. during construction of new building. Indemnity bond of \$500.00 to be furnished.  
On motion and second the light committee and city clerk were directed to ascertain from various cities of the 4th class their gas rates and other information relating to gas franchises.  
No further business appearing it was moved we adjourn. Adjourned.
