KNUTSON WILL WIN

Ever ready to help, Secretary of State Schmahl this week transferred his speaking activities to the Sixth district where he is making a special appeal for Harold Knutson, the Republican candidate for congress. Harold is not heavily endowed with this world's goods, something his Democratic opponent and the latter's management seem to have in plenty and the help given is timely. Mr. Knutson prevailed in the primaries by a vote of nearly two to one and odds are being given that he will be the next representative in congress from the Sixth district.

BINDER TWINE

Who is responsible for the increased price of binder twine? Congressman Steenerson of the Ninth district charges the increase of more than two cents over a year ago to the Wilson administration and it looks pretty much as if he was right. Sixty million pounds of twine worth \$23,000,000 were manufactured at the Stillwater prison this year has been covered by a few South American capitalists, aided by New York capital and Minnesota as a result must pay what this particular trust exacts. President Wilson, who could dispose of the corner with a stroke of the pen has refused to interfere. This year the farmers of Minnesota paid over \$500,000 more than they did a year ago for their twine and it is certain that they will double this figure next year.

WHAT GOV. HUGHES WOULD HAVE DONE

Governor Hughes struck out straight from the shoulder when a heckler in his audience at Louisville

demanding to know what he would have done when the Lusitania was sunk. After some difficulty with the audience which wanted to throw the heckler out, Mr. Hughes succeeded in quieting it and replied: "Sir, I would have had the state department, at the very beginning of the administration, so equipped as to command the respect of the world. Next, I would have so conducted our affairs in Mexico as to have shown them that our words meant peace and good will and protection of the lives and property of American citizens. And when I said 'strict accountability' every nation would have known that I meant it, when notice was published regarding the action threatened I would have made known in terms unmistakable and unequivocal that we would not tolerate a continuance of diplomatic relations if the threat were carried out."

It is not surprising to learn that the candidate's audience went wild with enthusiasm, that, as one correspondent describes it, "at Mr. Hughes' last word there came something more than a roar—it had a wilder, more hysterical quality—it was like a hysterical yell, and it lasted for several minutes, while thousands of men hammered each other on the back and threw their hats in the air and acted like men gone slambang crazy." And the demonstration was tremendous not because of words, but because his hearers believed that he meant what he said and knew that had he been president, the Lusitania would never have been sunk. As President Wilson was saying at Indianapolis, almost at the same moment, "speeches are interesting in proportion as the people who hear believe what the speaker says."

Spencer Makes Long Run. On a criss-cross Spencer goes through right tackle for 30 yards to Wadena's 33-yard line, being tackled by White. End of first quarter. Bemidji 0, Wadena 0.

Second Quarter. Kittleson tackles Hela for 1-yard gain. Spencer adds 10 yards off left tackle. Simons tackles Orr for no gain. Hela makes 2 yards around left end. Wadena penalized 5 yards for not having seven men on the line of scrimmage. Bemidji's ball, now on Wadena's 41-yard line. Bemidji penalized 5 yards when Simons was offside. Ball now on Wadena's 46-yard line. Bailey hits right guard for 1 yard. Bailey falls to gain around left end. Bailey's forward pass was intercepted by Erickson on Wadena's 35-yard line who is tackled by Achenbach for no return. Spencer goes through right guard for 5 yards. Wadena offside. Ball now on Wadena's 35-yard line. Spencer goes around right end for 9 yards. Hela makes 4 yards through right tackle for first down on Wadena's 48-yard line. Orr plows through left tackle for 7 yards to Bemidji's 45-yard line. Carew goes around left end for 1 yard. Spencer bucks left guard for 5 yards and first down on Bemidji's 34-yard line. Carew slides off right tackle for 8 yards. Orr hits center for 3 yards for first down. Hela circles right end for 4 yards. Grey breaks through and spills Orr for no gain. The ball is now on Bemidji's 19-yard line. Wadena is fighting hard to score but Bemidji's line seems impenetrable and Lord breaks through and throws Spencer for a 1-yard loss. Gores, the 220-pound tackle, is called back and tries for a drop kick and misses by but a few inches, and goes as a touchback. Bemidji punts ball in play on her own 20-yard line. Bailey makes 2 yards

off left tackle. Warfield hits center for 8 yards and first down. Madson dashes off right tackle for 5 yards. Wadena penalized 5 yards for offside. Warfield smashes center for 5 yards: Madson smashes through right tackle for 8 yards, planting the ball on Wadena's 47-yard line. Warfield slides through left tackle for 7 yards and first down. Bailey slips and falls but regains his feet nicely and makes 10 yards through left tackle by some clever sidestepping. Warfield makes 1 yard through right guard. Bailey makes 2 yards around left end. Madson goes around right end for 5 yards and first down on Wadena's 22-

yard line. End of first half; score 0 to 0.

Third Quarter. Bailey kicks out of bounds on the 1-yard line and the ball is called back. Bailey kicks off again to W. Saekes, who is tackled by Simons on Wadena's 25-yard line. Simons is hurt and time is taken out. Cochran goes in for Simons. Hela makes 5 yards around left end. Kittleson tackles Spencer for no gain. Hela's forward pass fails. Spencer punts 45 yards to Warfield on Bemidji's 25-yard line who is tackled in his tracks by Gores. Madson plows through right tackle for 8 yards. Bailey slides off left tackle for 10 yards. Warfield hits center for 5 yards. Madson gets around right end for 10 yards to Wadena's 42-yard line. Bailey makes a splendid open field run around Wadena's right end for 25 yards. Warfield makes 8 yards through right tackle. W. Murray tackles Warfield for a 1-yard loss. Bailey adds 3 yards through left tackle. Warfield plows through center and puts ball on Wadena's 4-yard line. Bailey dashes over right tackle for touchdown. Bailey punts to Gainey who heels the catch on the 17-yard line. Bailey kicks goal. Score: Bemidji 7, Wadena 0.

Bailey kicks to Carew on the 15-yard line who returns the ball to the 30-yard line. Orr plows through right tackle for 2 yards but fumbles and White falls on the ball on Wadena's 30-yard line. Erickson tackles Madson for no gain. Madson goes through right tackle for 8 yards. On a delayed pass White is tackled for a 2-yard loss by W. Murray. Bailey falls to gain around end and it is Wadena's ball on their own 29-yard line. Hela in two successive attempts at Grey fails to make a gain. Wadena is penalized 5 yards for having only six men on the line of scrimmage. Spencer punts 35 yards to Madson on Bemidji's 41-yard line,

who returned 3 yards to Bemidji's 44-yard line. End of third quarter. Score: Bemidji 7, Wadena 0.

Fourth Quarter. Bailey makes forward pass to Achenbach who drops the ball. Bailey goes through left tackle for 5 yards. Warfield goes through center for 10 yards. Bailey plows through left tackle for 8 yards but fumbles, Orr recovering the ball on Wadena's 33-yard line. Achenbach throws Spencer for a 2-yard loss. Orr makes 5 yards through left tackle. Opsahl breaks through and tackles Spencer for a 1-yard loss. Opsahl breaks through again and spills Carew for no gain and it is Bemidji's ball on Wadena's 39-yard line. Warfield makes 5 yards through center. Bailey slides through left tackle for 6 yards and first down. Warfield smashes center for 7 yards. Madson goes through right tackle for 4 yards and first down on Wadena's 18-yard line. Bailey hits center for 1 yard. Bailey makes 4 yards through left tackle. Warfield makes three yards through center. White on a delayed pass makes 1 yard through right guard. Warfield falls to gain through center and it is Wadena's ball on her own 9-yard line. Spencer punts out of bounds on the 30-yard line. Madson goes through right tackle for 4 yards. Warfield makes 3 yards through center. White bucks through the line for 2 yards. Bailey adds 2 yards through left tackle and first down on Wadena's 9-yard line. Madson dodges off right tackle for touchdown. Score, Bemidji, 13, Wadena 0. Bailey kicks goal. Score, Bemidji 14, Wadena 0. Bailey kicks to Erickson on the 15-yard line who returns 20 yards to his own 35-yard line. On next play Lord broke through and tackles Hela for a 5-yard loss. End of game.

BEMIDJI ELEVEN WINS HARD FOUGHT CONTEST

Wadena Defeated by a Score of 14 to 0; Neither Side Scores in First Half.

The Bemidji football team defeated the heavy Wadena team at Wadena Saturday by a score of 14 to 0. The game was the hardest fought contest of the season, neither side being able to score during the first half.

Bemidji's line was outweighed considerably, Gores, the Wadena right tackle, weighing 220 pounds. The Wadena team appeared to outweigh the Bemidji eleven, ten to twelve pounds to the man.

Day is Ideal. The day was ideal for football, the wind favoring neither side for kicking.

First Quarter. Spencer kicks to Warfield on 10-yard line, who returns 12 yards to 22-yard line. Bailey skirted left end for 6 yards. A forward pass, Bailey to White, netted 7 yards and first down on 35-yard line. Bailey hits left tackle for no gain. Warfield fumbles but White recovers ball for no gain. Madson makes three yards off right tackle. Warfield's pass to Simons was intercepted by Spencer who returned 12 yards to Bemidji's 40-yard line. Wadena was penalized 5 yards for not having 7 men on the line of scrimmage. Simons tackles Hela for no gain. Achenbach tackles Orr for a 5-yard loss. Gores punts 30 yards to Madson who returns to Bemidji's 27-yard line. W. Saekes tackles Bailey for no gain around left end. Madson makes 6 yards off right tackle. Warfield plows through right guard for 10 yards to Bemidji's 43-yard line for first down. Madson rips off 7 yards around Wadena's left end to the center of the field. Bailey hits left tackle for 1 yard. A punt formation Warfield circles Erickson for 15 yards to Wadena's 34-yard line. A forward pass, Warfield to White, fails. Madson plows through right tackle for 3 yards. Bailey makes 1 yard off left tackle.
