PRESIDENT OF WORLD'S AD CLUBS TO SPEAK IN ST. PAUL JAN 22.

St. Paul, Jan. 17.—The Minnesota Advertising men's convention to be held here January 22 and 23 will attract the most prominent advertising men and women in the United States and Canada, among them: W. C. D'Arcy, St. Louis, president of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World; P. S. Flores, Indianapolis, secretary and manager of the same organization; William G. Book, Toronto, Canadian vice president, and Merle Sidener, Indianapolis, chairman of the national vigilance committee.

The women speakers will include Miss B. M. Benton of St. Paul, who will address the community advertising section on "Films in Community Advertising."

The country's advertising leaders regard the St. Paul convention as the most important gathering short of the national conventions that has been held in the last five years. Its sessions will include an outline of the patriotic campaigns by which the government is making the flotation of the Liberty Loans a big success.

The convention headquarters will be at the Saint Paul. The St. Paul Advertising club made the convention possible for St. Paul. About 1,000 will attend. F. L. Madden is president of the St. Paul club, and W. J. Betting, as convention chairman, has direct charge of arrangements for the meeting.

A Necessary War Measure

Patriotic Bemidji, in prompt compliance with the Federal fuel conservation mandate, will be deprived of customary entertainments at the Grand and Elko theatres Monday next, and nine consecutive Mondays thereafter, unless there should be modification of the official order.

To promptly and cheerfully obey official edicts is not only the duty of soldiers, but that of all good citizens, though personal sacrifice is experienced by so doing.

While the loss in revenue to the Grand and Elko theatres will be considerable because of obeying the published desire of government executives—in advance of official notification—the theatre management regards the changed conditions as a necessary war measure, and cheerfully complies therewith.

That the government will lose an enormous revenue through being deprived of the customary receipts from tax on admissions Mondays is also apparent. This may be materially reduced through increased theatre patronage Saturdays, Sundays, Tuesdays and other days of the week than Mondays.

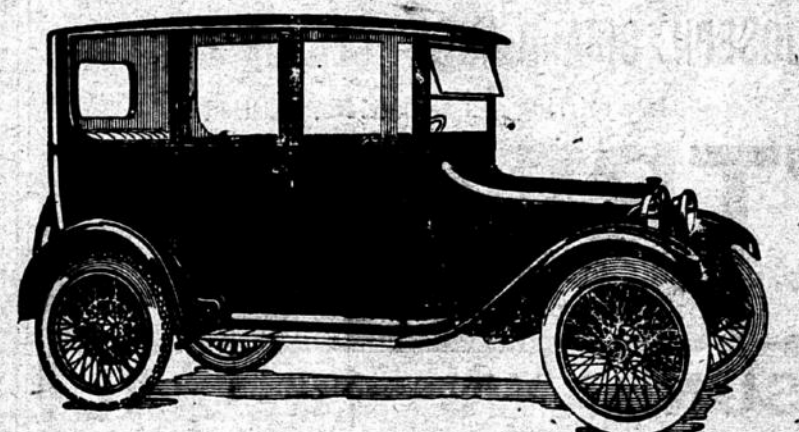
