None of the candidates have made extensive campaigns for Montana's preference.

BELGIAN BOY JUMPS RAPIDLY IN SCHOOL

Lawrence, Mass., April 23.—The remarkable progress in school made by Michael Schoonjans, aged fourteen, a Belgian refugee now in the sixth grade of the Bruce Grammar school, was called to public attention by further promotion of the lad by the school authorities. On September 4, 1919, he entered the special school here unable to speak one word of English. In four "jumps" he became a sixth grade pupil, notwithstanding the fact that he had but scant education in the Belgian schools. He saw the Germans bombard his home village for fifteen days, finally taking it. His uncle and cousin were killed by a bomb from a French plane.
