Officials Believe that Present Economic Depression Will Fill Schools

VACANCIES AFTER WAR HAVE GONE BEGGING

Five Hundred Congressional Vacancies Still Open for February 16

(By United Press) Washington, Jan. 12.—Application for entrance to West Point and Annapolis form an interesting index today to America's economic situation—so far as the young men of the country are concerned.

This developed here today in the belief expressed by officials of both academies that the present economic depression in the United States—whatever its cause or its probable duration—would remedy a situation which America's military and naval schools have faced since the end of the war.

But the situation is beginning now to adjust itself rapidly, according to both army and navy authorities here. With a noticeable diminution in the number of high-paid jobs, such as followed the war, the American youth apparently is reviving his appreciation of the opportunity to obtain an education, at the same time equipping himself for service as an officer in the army or navy.
