New Life-Saver.

To a lifeguard at Pablo Beach, Fla. is attributed the invention of a new kind of life-saving float, which is a cylinder of thin steel; pointed at both ends, three feet long and weighing only six pounds.

The contrivance is attached by short line to the guard's belt. Thus, if an adventurous swimmer be in danger of drowning outside the surf, the life saver can swim out to the rescue the float bobbing behind him. To the float are attached rope handgrasps. which the drowning person can grab.

The float, however, is connected with the shore by a long line, so that when the exhausted person has grabbed it he may easily be dragged eshore. Though very small in size it will support six men.

Honors for War Birds.

In France many pigeons have been decorated for distinguished war services; one with the Lagion d'Honneur.
