LEGION IN LCAN BUSINESS

Fargo, N. D. Post Adjutant Works Out Plan for the Benefit of His Buddies.

The first instance in which the American Legion has gone into the trust, savings and loan business i reported from Fargo, N. D. To encourage

thrift and to help the needy, the post, on January 1, 1921, instituted an American Legion Bonus Loan association from plans worked out by Arthur F. Col-

lar, post adjutant, Four hundred of the post's 700 members already have deposited sums from \$5 to \$25 on which five per cent interest is paid. A Legion man wishing to borrow assigns his state compensation claim to the Legion-it will require eight years for North Dakota to pay all service men the bonus awarded them. The borrower may obtain up to 50 per cent of the amount to be awarded him by the state. He pays interest at 8 per cent.

Business is transacted through a loans have been made and more than \$20,000 has been paid into the savings fund. A dividend is paid semi-annually to depositors. Infinediately upon being granted a loan; the person to whom it is made must open a savings account to insure proper expenditure of the money. Legion posts in many states have written the Fargo post for information upon which to base a simihar system.

Salt Makers of Bali.

"May the sea never lose its salt?" prays the Balinese, who fikes his rice salted. (Bali is an island near Java. under Dutch protection.) On a wellleveled, sandy plot the salt makers work in the sun, scattering sea water from light bowls, skillfully fashioned from pulm leaves. When the sun has absorbed the moisture, the laborers carefully skim off the surface sand, carry it to the thatched huts at the edge of the plot and put it into vats filled with water. After the sand has settled in the bottom of the vats, they draw off the brine into shallow yes sels of coconut wood, which they set out in the sun. In a few hours nothing remains but pure salt. The salt gained through this primitive process is deemed very precious by the Ballnese, who will sell his treasures for salt when money will not tempt him. But then money is of little value on Ball. 


