FINGERPRINT TOURISTS

(By United Press)
Paris, Oct. 4.—If a project just announced by the Prefect of Police, M. Leullier is approved by the ministry of the interior, every tourist coming to Paris for an extended visit will have to submit to fingerprinting before he, or she, can circulate without let or hindrance in this town of joy and bright light. As the law now stands, every visitor who intends to remain two weeks in France must obtain a carte d'identite, or certificate of identity, from the prefecture of police. French protests have induced the Reform Prefect, as M. Leullier is known, to propose the institution of a far new form of carte d'identite, which will include the holder's photograph and his, or her, digital impression. It will apply to foreigners as well as to natives.

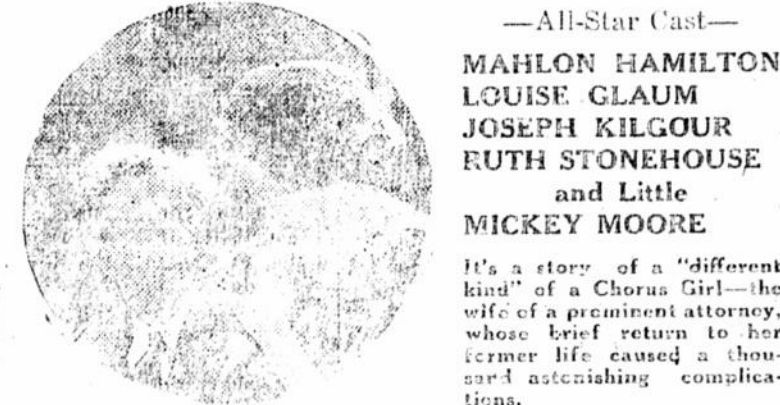
