LUMBER IS NOT PASSE

Tallow dips are still manufactured in large quantities, and the American Snuff Co. continues to earn generous dividends: sabers have not been banished by the blunder-buss nor the Lewis gun; the submarine has not put ships-of-the-line out of comission; and neither surburban trolley lines nor motor trucks have ruined the railroads. And says Willard C. Howe, editor of "Lumber" in Forbes Magazine, "nothing could be further from the truth than the assumption that substitutes are forcing lumber into the discard.

"Consideration of the new industries of recent years," continues Mr. Howe, "shows that most of them have developed as heavy consumers of lumber. Automobiles, talking machines, airplanes, radio-these and innumerable others have created new demands for forest products. From the time one sits down to breakfast at a table made of wood and picks up the morning paper, printed on wood, through the day and night, wood is a constant necessary servant, perfomning in a thousand ways. Because of the almost infinite variety of the demands for its products, the lumber industry is not, as some suppose a declining industry. Rather, it is an industry on the threshold of greater things."

EVERYBODY VOTE

To vote is the most important duty of the citizen. It is the only effective act by which the citizen exercises his power as an integral part of a self-governing people. So far as national affairs are concerned, the issue is fairly clear—whether the people of the country prefer to continue Republican control of congress or wish to return to Democratic policies. The issues have been very thoroughly discussed on the stump and in the press. The Democrat regime is not so far away but that its record can be fairly well remembered. The Republicans have had only 20 months of full control of the affairs of the government and have not yet had time to complete their program, but the record is extensive enough to enable the average voter to compare it with the record of the previous Democratic administration. The question is whether the country wants to go back to the Democratic rule, "Be careful how you vote."

HARDING AND 1924

All other efforts to create Republican dissension having failed the Democrats finally started the story that Harding will not run for the presidency again, the hope of the Democrats being thus to arouse rivalries. It don't work. Mr. Harding will not have much to say about running for a second term, provided his health keeps fairly good. If he keeps on with the splendid record he has made thus far, he will undoubtedly the renominated in spite of anything he could do. A man once honored by nomination and election could not refuse renomination unless failing health demanded, and Mr. Harding seems to be enjoying health and strength. If Mr. Harding continues to make good, his reelection is inevitable.
