A LONG CHASE.

A Gang of Horse-thieves Followed for a Distance of 500 Miles.

And are Overtaken on the Mesa Sixty Miles East of the Mouth of Tijeras Canon.

The Thieves Escape, But Thirty-four Head of the Horses Captured and Brought Back to this City.

Some time ago a gang of horse-thieves drove off a lot of horses from near Williams, Arizona, and started with them towards New Mexico. As soon as the theft was discovered a party was organized and started in pursuit of the thieves. They followed them through Arizona and into New Mexico and gained on the fugitives rapidly. At various places along the route stray horses which belonged to the drove were found that had dropped behind being unable to keep up the rapid march.

At McCarty's ranch the pursuers were joined by Pete Simpson, of Alma, who continued the chase with them. The party arrived in Albuquerque last Wednesday, where it was joined by Con Caddigan. Leaving Albuquerque the men rode over the mesa east of this city and through Tijeras cañon, continuing their eastern course over the high mesa on the east side of the Sandias.

After riding a long distance, Caddigan left the party and turned back, arriving in Albuquerque Friday afternoon. The remainder of the party kept up the chase, and six hours after Caddigan left them, came in sight of the horse thieves flock in number, in camp at 5 o'clock, Friday morning.

The thieves caught sight of their pursuers before they were within range, and started away as fast as they could travel. One of them was asleep, and they quit the camp on such short notice, that he had not time to put on his boots or coat, both of which articles are now being worn by Peter Carpenter. As the horse thieves left their camp, the men fired several volleys after them, but with what result has not been ascertained.

A little beyond the camping place, quietly grazing in a canon, was a drove of thirty-four horses, which the thieves were compelled to desert in their haste to escape. The horses were rounded up by Carpenter and the rest of the party, and were driven back to this city. Only a few of the animals stolen were missing.

Arizona is not a good place for horse thieves to ply their nefarious vocation, for as one of the boys who so successfully followed the rustlers said, "The Arizona boys generally accomplish what they set out to do." If some of that party of horse thieves do not stretch their legs before many moons have passed over their heads The Journal is slightly mistaken in its conjectures.
