In our rush last week we neglected to give an account of the action of the village trustees, at their meeting on Monday May 25th., at which time they established fire limits for the town which should have been done long ago. A fire district of the business part of the town was established as follows: Beginning at railroad boulevard at the north end of Copper avenue, it extends southward to Hemlock street; thence east to Platinum avenue; thence north to Railroad Boulevard; thence west to place of beginning, making in all a district of 10 blocks.
