THE approach of the Fourth reminds us that if something is not done here our citizens will go to some other town to celebrate and we will be losers thereby.

PREPARATIONS are being made now for the territorial fair and it is the intention of the Fair Association to make it the largest exhibition ever given in the territory. Will Luna county be there with an exhibit?

ATTORNEY General Knox and the interstate commerce commission now have the anthracite coal trust on the run. This does not look much as though President Roosevelt lacked the courage of his convictions.

SHOWERS are reported from various parts of the country making the ranges good and helping the crops, thus God smiles upon the people of New Mexico and bids them have pity for their less fortunate brothers in other parts of the country.

NEW England is burning up with drouth and the Mississippi valley is being washed away with excessive rain, probably this will be reversed in a year or two and the one that is now dry will be deluged while the other is parched with hot winds, during all this time the farmer of the arid regions will be steadily reaping big rewards from his irrigated lands which are sure as fate.

The special issue of the El Paso Herald is just out and gives a page to "Progressive Deming." It has articles on the past history of our town and the possibilities for investments, the rail roads, sanitarium, manufacturing opportunities, climate, soil and agricultural advantages of this region. In all it should be a valuable advertisement for our town, and advertising pays either a community or an individual.

LAST week, in the article regarding the Phelps Dodge Co. buying or building a railroad, we made a mistake in the name which should have read Major Wambaugh instead of Major Waddill, but the fact remains that the Phelps Dodge people are going to have a road from here to the mining camps of Santa Rita and Hanover and will doubtless have big reduction works in Deming for the treatment of ores taken from these mines as well as those brought from Arizona and Mexico.

DURING the past week the papers of the territory have been filled with articles denouncing the speech which Rev. Norman Skinner of Las Vegas is said to have made at the meeting of Presbyterian ministers in Los Angeles. These articles have varied in style and in strength of language used but all go to prove that the press of the territory regardless of political affiliations is ever ready to uphold the character of our people, either native or otherwise and that they will resent any insinuation against our school system, come from whom it may.

PRESIDENT Roosevelt is reported to have said: "I would like to be president of the United States for another term, but this much I will say, I propose to be president this term. I would rather be president for three years and a half than half president for seven years and a half," and the Topeka Journal thinks those who have watched the president's course since he took the oath of president will find little difficulty in believing that he said the words quoted. If he did not, it is what he would be expected to say if he undertook to express himself on the subject.

PERHAPS enough has been said in regard to the speech Rev. Norman Skinner is reported to have made at Los Angeles, and doubtless much has been said that should not have been, but we cannot help making some comment on such a prejudiced and untrue statement in regard to our people, made by a man of his standing and who owes his very life to our climate and the care he received from the citizens of Las Vegas 12 years past when he came to that place an invalid unable to live elsewhere. In the first place his statement in regard to the schools showed a disregard for truth which is surprising, astonishing! in a man who graces the sacred desk. What his reasons for defaming the native people could be is hard to explain from any point of view except that he gave his own feelings and prejudices against them as the general estimate which is placed upon them, and this personal opinion certainly shows that he had no christian feel-

ing for or desire to elevate and better the condition of the unfortunate or to see the merits of the more enlightened class who have had the advantages of education.

New Dynamo.

The business of the Deming Ice and Electric company has increased so that they have had to increase their facilities for furnishing light, a new dynamo of twice the capacity of the old one has arrived and is being put in place. This new one will be used ordinarily to furnish light and the old retained for use as a relay in case of necessity at any time if the large one should be laid up for repairs.

Sunday School Convention.

The program committee of the next annual territorial Sunday School convention to be held in Santa Fe June 9-11, announces that all the sessions will be held in the Methodist church instead of the Presbyterian church as formerly announced, on account of the objection of Rev. W. H. Moore; also that the address of welcome will be delivered by the Rev. W. A. Cooper, instead of by Mr. Moore, declined. No other changes in the program have been made.

Buried Image.

The workmen who dug the well on Dr. Swope's property where his new building is being erected found, at the depth of 50 feet, an image of a girl made of clay and burned like Indian Pottery. The image is in a fair state of preservation some of the yellow color showing quite plainly that it was colored with some substance aside from the clay of which it was made. The depth at which it was found is evidence that the surface of the ground here was once far below where we now live and it is possible that a pre-historic race lived in this valley some 50 or more feet below the present town of Deming.

Cattle Sales.

W. H. Greer of this city purchased, last week, for the Victoria Land & Cattle Co., 1,000 head of steers from T. L. & W. J. Stockton and 1,000 head of Martin & Sloan, 1,000 head of M. F. Fleming and 600 of Mullen and Whitmire all for fall delivery at Deming. Other large purchases are being made and there is a great activity in all branches of the cattle trade. The early rains are making an unusual growth of range grass and the hay crop will doubtless be the heaviest we have had in years, thus adding to the prosperity of the cattlemen and community.




