CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION

I, J. W. Reynolds, Secretary of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby certify there was filed for record in this office, at 9 o'clock a. m., on the thirteenth day of July, A. D. 1903, ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of The Faywood Lead Company. Certified to the State of Delaware, (No. 3470); and also, I have compared the following copy of the same, with the original thereof now on file, and declare it to be a correct transcript therefrom and of the whole thereof. In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my official seal this thirteenth day of July, A. D. 1903.

First:—The name of this corporation is the Faywood Lead Company.

Second:—Its principal office and place of business in the State of Delaware is to be located in the city of Wilmington, County of New Castle. The agent in charge thereof is Robert Pennington.

Third:—The nature of the business and the objects and purposes proposed to be transacted, promoted and carried on, are to do any and all of the things herein mentioned, as fully and to the same extent as natural persons might or could do, and in any part of the world, and especially in the United States.

To purchase, take on lease, or otherwise acquire any mines, mining rights and land in the Territory of New Mexico, Arizona or elsewhere, and any interest therein, and to explore, work, exercise, develop and turn to account the same; to quarry, smelt, refine, dress, amalgamate, concentrate and prepare for market ore, metal and mineral substances of all kinds, and to carry on any other operations which may seem conducive to any of the Company's objects; to buy, sell, manufacture and deal in minerals, plant, machinery, implements, tools, conveniences, provisions and things capable of being used in connection with mining operations or required by workmen and others employed by the Company; to construct, carry out, maintain, improve, manage, work, control and superintend any roads, ways, railways, bridges, reservoirs, water courses, aqueducts, wharves, furnaces, mills, crushing works, hydraulic works, works, factories, warehouses and other works and conveniences which may seem directly or indirectly conducive to any of the objects of the Company, and to contribute to, subsidize or otherwise aid or take part in any such operations.

To carry on the business of mining, milling, concentrating, converting, smelting, treating, preparing for market, manufacturing, buying, selling, exchanging and otherwise producing and dealing in gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, brass, iron, steel and in all kinds of ores, metals and minerals, and in the products and by-products thereof of every kind and description, and by whatsoever process the same can be or may hereafter be produced, and generally and without limit as to amount, to buy, sell, exchange, lease, acquire and deal in lands, mines and minerals, rights and claims, and in the above specified products, and to conduct all business appurtenant thereto.

To cause or allow the legal title, estate and interest in any property acquired, established or carried on by the Company, to remain or be vested or registered in the name of, or carried on by any other Company or Companies, foreign or domestic, formed or to be formed, and either upon trust, for, or as agents and nominees of the Company, or upon any other terms or conditions which the Board of Directors may consider for the benefit of this Company, and to manage the affairs or take over and carry on the business of such Company or Companies so formed, or to be formed, either by acquiring the shares, stocks or other securities thereof, or otherwise howsoever, and to exercise all or any of the powers of holders of shares, stocks or securities thereof, and to receive and distribute as profits the dividends and interest on such shares, stocks or securities.

To hold, purchase or otherwise acquire, to sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, and bonds, debentures or other evidences of indebtedness created by either corporation or corporations and while the holder thereof, to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to issue in exchange for same its own stock, bonds, notes, rights and privileges.

In furtherance and not in limitation, of the general powers conferred by the laws of Delaware, it is expressly provided that this corporation shall also have the following powers, viz:

To take own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of real property wherever situated.

To manufacture, purchase or acquire in any lawful manner, and to hold, own, mortgage, pledge, sell, transfer, or in any manner dispose of, and to deal and trade in goods, wares, merchandise and property of any and every class and description.

To acquire the good will, rights and property of any person firm, association or corporation; to pay for the same in cash, the stock of this Company

bonds or otherwise to hold or in any manner dispose of the whole or any part of the property so purchased; to conduct in any lawful manner the whole or any part of any business so acquired and to exercise all the powers necessary or convenient in and about the conduct and management of such business.

To apply for, or in any manner to acquire, and to hold, own, use and operate, or to sell or in any manner to dispose of, and to grant licenses or other rights in respect of, and in any manner deal with any and all rights, inventions, improvements and processes used in connection with or secured under letters patent or copyrights of the United States or other countries, to work, operate or develop the same and to carry on any business, manufacturing or otherwise, which may directly or indirectly effectuate these objects or any of them.

To enter into, make and perform contracts of every kind with any person, firm, association or corporation, and without limit as to amount, to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute and issue promissory notes, drafts bills of exchange, warrants bonds, debentures and other negotiable or transferable instruments, so far as may be permitted by the laws of the State of Delaware.

To have offices, carry on business and promote its objects without restriction as to place or amount.

To do any or all of the things herein set forth to the same extent as natural persons might or could do, and in any part of the world, as principals, agents, contractors, trustee or otherwise.

In General to carry on any other business in connection therewith, whether mining, manufacturing or otherwise, and with all the powers conferred upon corporations by the laws of the State of Delaware.

Fourth:—The amount of the total authorized stock of this corporation is One hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars and the par value of each share is One hundred (\$100) dollars. All of said stock shall be common stock.

The amount of capital stock with which it will commence business is One thousand (\$1,000) dollars, being ten (10) shares of the par value of One hundred (\$100) dollars each.

Fifth:—The names and places of residence of each of the subscribers to the Capital Stock are as follows:

Sixth:—The existence of this corporation is to be perpetual.

Seventh:—The affairs of this corporation are to be conducted by the officers and persons fixed by the By-Laws; and such persons are to be chosen at the times and places fixed by the By-Laws.

Eighth:—This corporation may become seized and possessed of either real or personal estate, or both, to an unlimited extent, but a limit to the value of the property so held may be fixed by the By-Laws.

Ninth:—The private property of the stockholders shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

Tenth:—The Directors shall have the power to make and to alter the By-Laws, and to fix the amount of cash to be reserved as working capital.

The By-Laws shall determine whether and to what extent the accounts and books of this corporation, or any of them, shall be open to the inspection of the stockholders; and no stockholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or book or document of this corporation, except as conferred by law of the By-Laws, or by resolution of the stockholders.

The stockholders or Directors shall have the power to hold their meetings and keep the books, outside of the State of Delaware, at such places as may be from time to time designated.

It is the intention that the objects specified in the third paragraph hereof, shall, except where otherwise expressed in said paragraph, be nowise limited or restricted by reference to or inference from the terms of any other clause or paragraph in this certificate of incorporation, but that the objects specified in each of the clauses of this charter shall be regarded as independent objects.

WE THE UNDERSIGNED, for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Delaware, do make, record and file this certificate and do certify that the facts herein stated are true; and we have accordingly hereunto set our respective hands and seals.

TILLMAN ACQUITTED.

The Nation will Consider This a Disgrace Upon South Carolina.

Lexington, S. C., Oct. 15. The jury in the case of J. H. Tillman found him not guilty. The jury announced at 10:45 that the verdict had been agreed upon. The defendant and his attorney were sent for and the verdict was read. A demonstration followed the announcement, the friends of the defendant giving vent to their feelings in shouts. The jury was out twenty hours before reaching a verdict. The defendant left the court room accompanied by his friends and counsel.

SPANISH CONFERENCE.

The annual conference of the New Mexico Spanish Mission of the Methodist Episcopal church opened its sessions in the Bowman church in Old Albuquerque at 8:30 a. m. October 8th., with Bishop J. F. Walden in the chair. The order of business was taken up and carried on in accordance with the rules of the church. Nearly all the preachers of the conference answered to their names as they were called by Secretary T. M. Harwood. The reports of the ministers were very interesting as the Bishop examined carefully the character of each as they came before him.

The conference closed on the evening of the 11th, by the reading of appointments by the Bishop. The following changes are noted: The district of Arizona and Sonora and that of El Paso have been united and Rev. Thos. Harwood superintendent of the mission, acts as presiding elder. Owing to the death of Rev. Benito Sanchez, presiding elder of the Santa Fe district, Rev. E. C. Salazar of Albuquerque was transferred to that district and T. M. Harwood was appointed to fill vacancy in Albuquerque district. Rev. Epigenio Flores was appointed pastor at Tucson and Leandro Fernandez to Bisbee Arizona. On account of the great increase in the Membership at Deming Rev. Dionicio Costales, pastor of Deming, Dwyer and Cooks, was directed to change his residence from Dwyer to Deming. The conference closed with invocations by the Bishop and Dr. Harwood.

LITIGATION SETTLED.

Clifton Copper Company—Suit Settled Out of Court.

Silver City, 14.—The long hotly contested litigation in which the Clifton Copper company was plaintiff and Charles L. Ashton and William Roach of Silver City, and H. C. Bogole of St. Louis were defendants, and in which over \$150,000 were involved, has been amicably settled, out of court. The property is located near Santa Rita in Grant county, New Mexico, and has been developed to a depth of 300 feet and shows a forty foot vein of valuable concentrating copper ore, as well as many smaller streaks of high grade ore. The community generally is well pleased at the settlement; as this magnificent property which has been lying idle for two years, will now be operated on a large scale, and with good profit to the stockholders. Col. P. R. Smith of Deming, who represents the company, says the settlement is entirely satisfactory to all parties, and all will now work together for the general good of the company. There are thousands of tons of good ore blocked out, and ready to raise, and the mill will be increased from its present capacity of sixty-five tons daily to 200 tons daily, in the near future.

FOR SUNDAY CLOSING.

Kansas City, Oct., 15.—Addressing the annual convention of the Roadmasters and Maintenance of Way Association here today, A. C. Morris, of Pittsburg, Pa., advised his hearers to treat their men with consideration. "Give your men one day in Seven to rest," said Mr. Morris, "And let that day be Sunday. The company loses money on every man who does not rest one day in seven. Let the men spend Sunday with their families at home and you will have better men. It is economy for the company and kindness to the men."

THE TERRITORIAL FAIR

Biggest Exhibition Ever Given in the Southwest—Fine Exhibits of Mineral and Agricultural Products.

Last week the greatest exhibition ever held in the southwest was held in Albuquerque. The 23rd annual Territorial Fair was far ahead of any previous exhibition given by the Association. Large amounts of money were expended in furnishing sports for the entertainment of the people and the result of this was that the sports at this fair were the best to be secured in the country and thoroughly appreciated by the great number of people from every part of the country who saw them.

The agricultural and mineral exhibits were of the best and were examined with interest, not unmingled with wonder, by hundreds of eastern people who will have a much better knowledge of our resources, than they had before seeing the fair, and who will do much free advertising for the territory on account of it. San Juan county was there as usual, with a fruit exhibit such as could hardly be gotten up any where outside of New Mexico. This exhibit consisted of 20 six-horse loads of produce hauled in wagons 200 miles, while Roswell and the Pecos valley region had a car load and the Mesilla valley a car load. Grant, Sierra Socorro Santa Fe, Taos and other counties were well represented with both minerals and fruits so that the great hall was crowded to its utmost capacity to make room for all. There were also examples of work done at the various educational institutions of the territory which would be a credit to any of the eastern states. As a means of bringing our people together and giving an impetus to our progress as well as advertising our resources there is no one association that does more than the Territorial Fair Association and it is to the credit of the people of the Territory that nearly every community assisted in this great work. We look forward to next year's event with even more interest than we did to this one.

REVIVAL SERVICES.

The revival services which have been in progress for the past week are creating much interest and many conversions are resulting. Last Sunday evening 23 names were taken for church membership and the work is going on this week with even more interest than last. Rev. Collie and his daughters are devoted workers and their enthusiasm is being felt in the community both in the church and out of it. They will be with us all of this week, and perhaps longer if the work demands it.
