Protecting Canna Roots

Some time ago one of the county agriculturists made inquiry regarding the best method of protecting the canna roots during the winter, and the following reply was sent by the New Mexico Agricultural College: Bailey, in his 'Cyclopedia of Amer-

ican Horticulture,' has the following to say in regard to the canna:

"In the fall, when the plants are killed by frost and the top have dried a few days, dig the roots and let them dry as if they were potatoes. Then store them on shelves in the cellar, or any place where potatoes will keep well. Take care that the roots do not become too warm, particularly before cold weather sets in; or too moist. Well cured roots from well matured plants usually keep without difficulty.
