THREE GUSHERS IN NEAR BURKBURNETT

Latest Sensation of Mid-Texas Fields Producing 10,000 Barrels Daily

Wichita Falls, April 23—Humble No. 2, in the northeastern corner of block 58, northwest of Burk Burnett, is in today and reported to be making 150 barrels per hour. The Golden Cycle Oil company well on block 75, further to the northwest, is running a six-inch stream of oil and no effort has been made to gauge its production. Gilliland No. 17 on the Hardin, is also reported in and making at the rate of 3,000 barrels a day. It is estimated that the three wells, the latest sensations of the Burk Burnett field, are making more than 10,000 barrels of oil a day. The Burk-Wagoner is holding up around 3,000 barrels and the stock is quoted around 15 to 1.

Today's developments are the most interesting of any in the history of the field since the original Fowler well was brought in and there is much excitement in the city as a result.

ANOTHER OIL BOOM IN BURKBURNETT

Wildcat schemes in the Burk Burnett district are fading and the oil game is getting down to a substantial solid basis, according to W. P. Mason, who returned Saturday from an inspection trip to the oil fields.

Mason believes that the production from the fields in that section will increase from 45,000 barrels daily to 100,000 or perhaps 125,000 barrels. Block 45 has a good well and four or five wells on block 43 are on the sand and setting casings. The Texas Oil on block 44 is down three hundred and eighty feet, struck an eight-foot sand at 255 feet which made a good showing for a shallow well and it is expected that another sand will be reached at 600 feet which can be worked on acreage and another sand is expected between 900 and 1,000 feet. The Fowler sand is expected at 1,750 feet.

Mason believes that fifty or seventy-five new derricks will be erected west of block 45 within the next three or four weeks. The strata, according to Mason runs toward the Sevier and Haining leases, extending to the Burk Burnett field five miles to the west.
