

OLD CLAIM TO BE PUSHED.

HIRAM YOUNG'S WIDOW ASKS THE GOVERNMENT TO PAY A DEBT.

For Years and Years Young Tried to Get a Settlement for the Deprivations of Federal Troops—\$18,750 Is Asked.

The claim against the United States government for \$18,750 which about thirty years ago was made by the widow of Hiram Young, of Independence, has been once more started through the legal channels and is now in the hands of the department of claim at Washington.

There are many people in Jackson county who insist that the government has been doing the heirs an injustice for many years by not paying the claim, as they say it was a just one from the first and the debt ought never to have been questioned.

Hiram Young was a negro wagonmaker at Independence, prior to the war, and was known by every freighter on the Santa Fe trail. He had earned enough to pay his ransom from his master and was for many years in business and had a large property. One of his early day specialties was the making of ox yokes and bows for use in the ox teams on the freight wagons.

There is a skill in the shaping and making of bows and yokes that few men possessed and it is claimed the goods manufactured by Young were absolutely reliable and never failed to stand the test. He also made heavy old humpback wagons for the freighters and it is said one of his old hickory wagons never failed to give a proper account of itself.

With the development of the trade on the trail the demand for the goods manufactured by Young increased and he was prospering. This was his condition at the opening of the war and he had a large farm, had many wagons in his shop and was comfortably fixed for life. But Federal troops passed his way and he was picked for the men of war.

In the bill he submitted to the department of claims and the government took from him 7,000 bushels of corn that was worth at that time \$150 per bushel, and thirty-seven wagon loads of hickory for \$250 each. That made his claim \$10,750 and thirty years since he asked for payment.

He "arow up" among thieves and evil women. Yesterday a jury in the criminal court found him guilty of highway robbery and fixed his punishment at six years in the penitentiary. Two remaining charges of highway robbery are on the books against him, and he will probably be in the penitentiary for the same term that will be imposed for this offense is five years, so in the natural order of events he has a stretch of sixteen or more years ahead of him at Jefferson City.
