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BIG ST. LOUIS FIRE.

MERMOD & JACCARD JEWELRY COMPANY BURNED OUT.

LOSS COVERED BY INSURANCE. ONLY THE STOCK THAT WAS IN THE VAULT WAS SAVED.

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 19.—A fire started in the basement of the building occupied by the Mermord & Jaccard Jewelry Company, at the corner of Locust street and Broadway, early this morning and in an almost incredibly short time the five story building was completely gutted.

The fire had been burning some time before it was discovered, at 4:30 o'clock, and it took the south wall and all the floors before it was extinguished.

The Mermord & Jaccard Jewelry Company was one of the largest in the world, and this being Christmas season, carried an immense stock, one-half of the stock had been placed in the two large vaults, and was saved, but the rest, as well as the building and fixtures, was totally destroyed.

The Model Cask Company, in the northeast corner of the building, was wiped out, sustaining a loss of \$50,000, on which there is an insurance of three-fourths.

The Mermord & Jaccard carried insurance amounting to \$60,000, which, if the stock in the vaults is found intact, will amply cover the loss sustained.

Late to-night the burned out firm decided to continue in business, and to-morrow will take possession of the store and stock which they have sought to recover.

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THE CHINESE GRAB.
