

NEW COLONY OFF FOR ALASKA

WILL LEAVE KANSAS CITY TO-DAY WITH DEFINITE PLANS. Colony is to be run on the Co-Operative Plan and 100 Colonists, Mostly From Joplin, Will Follow in March.

"We are on our way to Fort Wrangle, Alaska to found a colony based on co-operative principles," said W. Foster, of Joplin, at the Hotel Savoy yesterday. He referred to himself and wife, George Pasquella, of St. Joseph, and Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Traylor, of Joplin, who form the official body and advance guard of the company that will found the colony. They will leave for Seattle this morning, and other members of the colony, about 100, will sail from Seattle on the 23rd of March. Most of them will go from Joplin.

The company will be known as the Alaskan Mining Company. It will be about 1200 acres of land, with the water front on the mainland opposite Fort Wrangle, and on that will build an ore crusher and stamp mills and found two cities. They expect to accept a royalty as the company's share of the profits. They will run their mining property on the mining laws of Alaska. It gives them men an opportunity of developing claims and securing a fair share of the profits, and still leaves the company a long way ahead.

Fort Wrangle is on an island four miles from the mainland. The colony will be at the foot of what is known as the Deaton trail, over which they expect many thousands of prospectors to go to the Klondike in the spring. They hope to induce many of them to locate in the colony, and some of the members of the colony are now ready to go, and have enough cash to keep them in good shape until the business ventures begin to return dividends.

The location of the colony was chosen, and all plans have been perfected by men with plenty of experience in Alaska mines. They are familiar with the country, and they claim there is an abundance of high grade ore that will yield an immense profit. The company will have all necessary machinery and develop its own mines, do business in reducing ore for others, and collect royalties.

The members will each enter all "and allowed, and will put it in among the assets of the company." The combined resources of the members, and each will be equally interested in the success of the undertaking.

LIFE OF MRS. JOSEPHINE AYER.

Her Death in Paris Comes as a Shock to Boston and New York Friends. Boston, Mass., Jan. 6.—Josephine Mellin Southwick Ayer, widow of Dr. James C. Ayer, died suddenly at her home near the Hotel de Invalides, Paris, on Monday afternoon last, in comparatively good health. She was 73 years of age. Her death in New Year greetings to her children who live in this city.

Mrs. Ayer was born in Medway, near Boston, on December 15, 1825. Her father, Royal Southwick, was of an old-fashioned type of New England character. He was a member of the Society of Friends and a fervid abolitionist. Her mother, Mrs. Mary He was a direct descendant of Lawrence and Cassandra Southwick, two names celebrated in the history of Lowell. Mrs. Ayer's mother was Dorea Clavin, sister of the late Horace H. and Aaron Clavin, founders of the great wholesale shoe house in America. Her parents moved to Lowell when she was only an infant. Much of her girlhood time was divided between her own home and that of the late Mrs. H. H. Lowell.

She was at her home in Lowell last night and late in the afternoon of Monday, Jan. 6. Mrs. Ayer lived in Lowell until the death of her husband. She then came to New York, and for a number of years resided in this city. Since 1889 she has been living in Paris. She was married to Dr. James C. Ayer, and one daughter, Mrs. Leslie J.
