COMPARES HIS TRIAL FOR MURDER TO A GAME OF CARDS.


Jury Is Sworn and the Taking of Testimony Begins—Opening Statements for the State, and Defense.

"This trial is like a game of cards. The state's got Lowe, and I've got high, jack and the game; I'm dealing, and I'll beat 'em out."

This was the remark made by Bill Adler yesterday afternoon a few minutes before his trial for murder began. An artist for the Journal asked Adler yesterday to sketch a piece of paper that a tracing of its exact size could be made.

"Not on your life," said Adler. "Why not?" "I've got all the notoriety I want."
