BIG ADDITION TO CITY'S RAPID TRANSIT FACILITIES.

It is Proposed to Build Fifty Miles of Tracks—Northeast Electric to Be Part of the New System—The Incorporators.

The Central Electric Railway Company, which is capitalized at \$1,000,000, yesterday filed articles of incorporation with the recorder of deeds.

The new company proposes establishing lines running into Washington and Fairmount parks and connecting with the Northeast electric line.

It is said that the entire business section of this city will be taken in, a feature of this, which is to be the main line, being an immense loop, the western lines will diverge.
