

WON'T PUT A CENT ON LEEDY

NEITHER WILL HE ON SIMPSON, OR PETERS, OR VINCENT.

Finally Offers to Wager \$10 That Ridgely Will Win in the Third District, but Will Risk Nothing on Any Other Candidate.

TOPEKA, Oct. 26.—(Special.) Taylor Riddle, chairman of the Populist state committee, is not willing to back his judgment as to the result of the coming election by cash. To-day a well known Democrat, who never overlooks a chance to make a dollar, called at Populist headquarters.

"I see you say Leedy will be elected by 12,000 majority," said he to Riddle. "How much money have you to wager on that proposition?"

"Not a cent," replied Riddle. "Have you any money to say that Leedy will be elected at all?"

"No, I haven't," replied Riddle. "I have from \$100 to \$500 to bet that Stanley will be the next governor of Kansas. If you are so certain that Leedy will win you had better take some of it."

Riddle declined. The man then asked if the Pop state committee or any attaché or friend had any money to wager that Stanley would not be elected by 10,000 plurality.

Riddle could not think of anyone. "If you are so certain that Peters will be elected," Bowersack in the Second district," he asked Riddle.

"I have none," was the reply. "Will you bet that Curtis will beat Price?"

"Will you bet that Vincent defeats Caldwell?"

"Can you take up a little money to bet that Martin defeats Miller in the Fourth district?"

"I tell you I won't bet." "Will you risk a little money on McCormick in the Sixth?"

"I am sure that you will risk a little on Simpson's election. You say he will get 6,000 majority. I am willing to bet a little that Long will defeat him."

"I just said I would not bet." "How about the third? Are you willing to bet on Ridgely?"

"Well, we might take some money on that." "Oh, I see, you will then bet on Ridgely, but not one else. How much will you take?"

"Ten dollars." "Is that all? Well, I will take that. Now that you have shown that you will bet I would like to put a little money on the other candidates."

"I am absolutely refused." "What kind of a fellow are you, anyway?" asked the Democrat of Riddle. "You would defeat Miller by 1,000; that McCormick will win by 1,000; that Vincent will beat Caldwell by 1,000; that Long will win by 1,000; that Stanley will win by 1,000; and yet you will not bet a cent on any of them. You are a man up to the eyes in money, but you are not willing to bet a cent on any of them."

ARE TRYING ANOTHER TACK. Populists Send Out Agents to Do Personal Work Among the Voters.

TOPEKA, Oct. 26.—(Special.) The Pops have practically abandoned the idea of trying to make votes by the meeting process and have turned to the old-fashioned plan now in use by the Democrats. The plan now is to put agents in the field to do personal work. Two-thirds of the officials around the state house are out trying to line up their voters. All of the subordinates who are scattered at the various institutions are also in the field. Besides these, a number of paid agents are on the road, including some of McNall's road agents.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, Oct. 26.—Major Fottell, in command of the United States troops at Manzanillo and military governor of the city, telegraphed to-day that the Cuban general, Rios, offers armed men to assist the Americans in preserving order, who never overlook a chance to make a dollar.
