KANSAS CITY GETS ST. LOUIS RATE FROM OKLAHOMA.

Passenger Rates From Kansas City to Texas Points—A Movement of Regulars to Fort Riley—Railroad News.

Advice was received yesterday from the Frisco that they would make a round trip rate from Oklahoma City to Kansas City for \$5, to be on sale Tuesday only, and good returning on regular trains up to and including Saturday night. This rate also applies to St. Louis and the Frisco will probably take the bulk of the traffic to that point. The Santa Fe announces that it will meet the competition of the Frisco on the same dates and with like privileges. This is a fair rate for Kansas City and is the rate that should prevail when it was known that the Frisco was to run an excursion from Oklahoma City to St. Louis.

B. & O. ROYAL LIMITED.

Most Magnificent Train in the World Inspected by Citizens of the National Capital.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—A large crowd, including many invited guests, visited the Baltimore & Ohio depot today to inspect the new royal limited train which has attracted marked attention for its elegance and beauty, and is soon to be added to the traveling facilities between New York and Washington. The train is made up of parlor, cafe, observation, dining and smoking cars, all of the metropolitan type, and is distinguished by its sumptuousness of furnishing suitable to the service between the national capital and the metropolis. The parlor cars are of Persian design, the rich interiors showing royal blue as the prevailing tone of upholstery and decoration. The dining and observation cars are models of car comfort and elegance. Another train, the "Royal Limited," will be added to the system between New York and Washington leaving each point at 3 p. m. and arriving at their destination at 8 p. m.

ADJUSTMENT OF TEXAS RATES.

SCARCITY OF ROLLING STOCK.

Grain Men Have Difficulty in Getting Their Grain to the Eastern Markets.

The grain men are experiencing great difficulty in getting cars enough to carry their grain. But a small per cent of this year's grain crop has been moved and the old corn crop of 1897 is not all moved. This car famine is general, but is felt most in the West, where there is plenty of grain waiting to be moved. The present low rates on grain are not very remunerative to the railroads, and a suspicion is out to the effect that the railroads are keeping their cars in a territory where they can be used to the best advantage. In the South there is a good cotton crop with lots of it to be moved to the market, and the same is true of much better than the present grain rates. The fact that during the last year \$9,000,000 new cars have been built, and that the number is increased each week leads to the belief that there is a corner on cars at this time.
