ENGINEER GOODALE RETURNS

HAS INSPECTED THE BIG EASTERN FREIGHT HOUSES.

Work on the Big Kelley Mill Will Begin Soon—Bradstreet's Reports That Collections Have Returned to Normal Condition Here.

Chief Engineer L. F. Goodale, of the Burlington, has just returned from a tour of the East, where he has examined all the fine modern freight houses and he now declares that he knows more about freight buildings than any body.

Mr. Goodale looked into the matter in behalf of the new freight house which the Burlington has decided to put into Kansas City this season. The freight house will be a mammoth building, 300 feet long, and both Mr. Goodale and Mr. Harmon say that it will be fitted with every modern improvement known for the convenient handling and storage of freight.

The Burlington road thinks a good deal of Kansas City and has the highest confidence in her future. A year or two ago the officials told Mr. Harmon to get up some kind of a plan which would be needed here in the way of freight house, track and other facilities to conveniently handle the business in this growing city.

McGee formerly lived in Kansas City and was at one time engaged in running a small furniture store on the corner of McGee street. It has been only a few weeks since he returned to Sedalia and he came here Thursday morning to settle up his accounts.

McGee is a member of Western Star Lodge No. 102, of the city of Sedalia, Mo. He says he also belongs to the U. W. and that he carries \$4,000 life insurance in the two orders.
