STRONG ANTI-GERMAN FEELING

CEREBRO SPINAL MENINGITIS ATTACKS TROOPS IN AFRICA.

Figaro's Dreyfus Revelations Have Created a Sensation in Germany

LONDON, April 8.—The evening of the Samoan entanglement followed with keen interest here, especially in colonial circles.

The newspapers point out the growing importance of Samoa to New Zealand and the significance of the latter's offer to send volunteers to Samoa.

The alleged interview with the United States ambassador to Germany, Andrew D. White, published in the Munich Allgemeine Zeitung (abled to the Associated Press on Friday afternoon), has attracted attention, but the utterances attributed to Mr. White are not generally credited.

The Morning Post concludes: "No United States official could have discussed the circumstances in the tone alleged by the Munich Allgemeine Zeitung of Mr. White."

The Spectator, which thinks that "preposterous importance" has been given to the whole affair, says: "Great Britain only needs a cooling station, if she needs one."

In view of the cables reports that many of the American soldiers who have been attacked by cerebro spinal meningitis, a representative of the Associated Press saw the medical authorities of the war office with reference to the dispatch from Cairo to the Daily Telegraph, saying that removed from Omdurman owing to the persistence of cerebral meningitis.

The Figaro's revelations in the publication of the evidence presented to the court of cassation in the Dreyfus case are highly praised, and have revived the keenest interest in the Dreyfus case.

The visit of the king and queen of Italy to Sardinia next week will be an interesting occasion and from some standpoints significant. The event will shape the naval program in the harbor of Genoa.

It is announced that the Prince of Wales has succeeded in definitely arranging for the success to open in May or June, the Royal College of Science, in which the science collection in the South Kensington museum will be housed.

GERMANS ARE BITTER. Accuse England of Trying to Involve Germany and America in Trouble.

BERLIN, April 8.—The Samoan question continues to hold the attention of the public, the newspapers being full of dispatches and comments on the subject.

The delay of Great Britain in accepting the proposals for a settlement of the difficulty, which the United States ambassador, Mr. Andrew D. White, attributed mainly to the absence of the Marquis of Salisbury from London, is generally interpreted in Germany as showing distinctly unfriendly intentions upon the part of Great Britain.

The correspondent of the Associated Press has had an interview on the subject with a high foreign official, who said: "It has been a source of regret and astonishment that Great Britain, unlike the United States, has not expressed regret at the latest turn of affairs in Samoa."
