

WHEAT A LITTLE STRONGER

Expectation of Bullish Government Crop Report the Cause.

Prospect of an Early Settlement of the Strike at Buffalo Also has a Bullish Influence on Dealings in the Pit.

CHICAGO, May 9.—Prospects to-day of an early settlement of the strike at Buffalo and sentiment among traders that the government crop report to-morrow would be bullish strengthened wheat. July closed with a gain of 1/8c. Corn advanced 1/4c. Oats lost 1/8c. Pork declined 30c, lard 1/4c.

A decline of 10 points in the Michigan state report since April 1 started wheat firm. There was a soft spot early, owing to profit-taking, but the market became strong again on a reported improvement in the strike at Buffalo. It is felt that the government report would make the winter wheat condition between 70 and 80 compared to 75 to 80 last year, and closed with sellers at 72 3/4c to 73c. Receipts were light. Chicago received ninety-seven bushels of wheat, 100,000 bushels of corn, and 100,000 bushels of oats, compared with 100,000 bushels of wheat, 100,000 bushels of corn, and 100,000 bushels of oats last year.

Corn weakened early and sold under pressure. It fell on a decrease of 10 points in the world's supply. Cash demand was good. Receipts, 250 cars. July opened 85c, declined to 84c, and closed at 84 1/2c. Oats declined sharply under heavy liquidation, but rallied on a report that the crop was better than expected. Receipts were 100,000 bushels of wheat, 100,000 bushels of corn, and 100,000 bushels of oats.

Prospects of inspection laws being passed in Germany and uniformity in trade means handicapped provisions. A break in the price of hogs at the yards also had a weakening influence. The market closed lower, at 85c, declined to 84 1/2c, advanced to 85 1/2c, and closed at 85c.
