WILL ASK HIM TO VOTE KANSAS CITY. DEMO CRATIC CONVENTION FROM DEMOCRATIC CLUB TO GO TO ST. LOUIS.

Mr. Bryan is willing for the Convention to Come Here and the Kansas Committee, J. G. Johnson, Will Help to Secure It.

The move on the part of New York city to secure the national Democratic convention has been observed by those who have to hand the matter of bringing that convention to Kansas City.

It was also deemed wise to tackle Mr. Bryan on the subject and, accordingly, the claims of Kansas City were presented to him extensively when he was here some days ago.

The Kansas member of the committee, Mr. Johnson, has also been accosted and has expressed the hope that the convention will meet here.

Having rounded up the situation and done this work, a committee was yesterday appointed by President J. W. Swafford of the Democratic Club, to visit St. Louis, leaving here to-night.

Some of the members of the committee may not be able to get away from here until the 15th, but they will be ready to go to St. Louis with the purpose in view.

It is believed that St. Louis will readily consent to this, as it has the world's fair ground and several other big attractions, and has recently had a convention.

What the Convention Will Mean. The spending of more than \$1,000,000 in Kansas City will be among the many benefits that accompany the national convention.

THEY MUST BE HELD IF SCHOOL BONDS FAIL TO CARRY.

ELECTION TO BE HELD JUNE 22. SCHOOL BOARD WILL ASK THAT \$400,000 BE VOTED.

Friends of the Schools Declare It is Ridiculous That the Schools of Kansas City Should Be in Such an Overcrowded Condition.

She Married a Douglas. This was in 1850, to John E. Douglas, a first cousin of Stephen A. Douglas. This husband died in 1860, from which time she remained a widow until June 1, 1899, when she again wed—James Morgan, of Galena, Kas., whose age is 70 years.

Her Life as a Pioneer. Their pioneer life in Missouri was one of great hardships. The frequent attacks of the Indians made their life one of constant fear.
