Governor Dockery's Appointments.

The last legislature passed a bill creating a new judicial circuit, which comprises the counties of Christian, Douglas, Ozark, Stone and Taney, and vested power of appointment of judge in the governor. His appointees will serve until the next general election, when a successor will be chosen. In compliance with this law, Governor Dockery Tuesday afternoon appointed George W. Thoraberry of Galena, Stone county, being selected over applicants from every other county in the circuit.

The governor also made the following additional appointments Tuesday. R. C. Clark, Fayette. Howard county, member of the board of managers of the state reform school for boys, located at Booneville, vice J. H. Zollinger, resigned.

One hundred thousand cattle must be removed from the grazing lands of the Wichita country by August 5, so as to get the land ready for the opening.

A bolt of lightning struck among eighty inmates of the Central Kentucky asylum for the insane at Lakeland, Ky. One person was killed and another knocked unconscious and a general panic ensued for a short time.

W. H. Quack, of Nevada, reports the finding of lead, zinc, copper and silver ore on a tract of land seventeen miles east of that town. The work of development will begin soon.
