HEREFORDS ARE HARD TO DOWN.

Walter B. Waddell Made Good Sales—Calves Shipped to Old Mexico.

Walter B. Waddell, one of Missouri's leading and most zealous Hereford cattle breeders, who recently returned from Louisville, Ky., where he attended and officiated as one of the managers of the great live stock exhibit, says that Missouri covered herself all over with glory in contesting for prizes. In one ring of twenty-five handsome Herefords every one of them went from Missouri and the Herefords of this state captured 90 per cent of the entire amount offered for prizes on Hereford cattle. At the Louisville show \$4,000 in prizes were awarded to the Herefords, \$4,000 to the Shorthorns and \$4,000 to the Aberdeen-Angus breed.

Mr. Waddell took with him to

ship some choice Herefords to Kansas City for the coming show.

Mr. Waddell and Mr. Comstock, the latter of Albany, Mo., constitute the committee on prizes for those that are past. Both are great admirers of the Hereford breed and make splendid showings for Missouri wherever they go.

Mr. Waddell shipped a fine Hereford calf to parties in Old Mexico about a week ago, and while at Louisville sold another to go to the same country.

INTELLIGENCER'S WAR REMINISCENCES

GOVERNOR JACKSON'S PROCLAMATION.

A series of unprovoked and unparalleled outrages have been inflicted upon the peace and dignity of this Commonwealth, and upon the rights and liberties of its people, by wicked and unprincipled men professing to act under the authority of the United States Government; the solemn enactments of your Legislature have been nullified; your volunteer soldiers have been taken prisoners; your commerce with sister States has been suspended; your trade with your own fellow-citizens has been, and is, subjected to the harassing control of an armed soldiery; peaceful citizens have been imprisoned without warrant of law; unoffending and defenseless men, women, and children have been ruthlessly shot down and murdered; and other unbearable indignities have been heaped upon your State and yourselves.

To all these outrages and indignities you have submitted with a patriotic forbearance, which has only encouraged the perpetrators of these grievous wrongs to attempt still bolder and more daring usurpations.

It has been my earnest endeavor under all these embarrassing circumstances to maintain the peace of the State, and to avert if possible from our borders the desolating effects of a civil war. With that object in view, I authorized Major-General Price several weeks ago to arrange with Gen. Harney, commanding the Federal forces in this State, the terms of an agreement by which the peace of the State might be preserved. They came, on the 21st May, to an understanding which was made public. The State authorities have faithfully labored to carry out the terms of that agreement. The Federal Government on the other hand not only manifested its strong disapprobation of it, by the instant dismissal of the distinguished officer, who, on its part, entered into it; but it at once began, and has unintermittently carried out, a system of hostile operations, in utter contempt of that agreement, and in reckless disregard of its own pledged faith. These acts have latterly portended revolution and civil war, so unmistakably, that I resolved to make one further effort to avert these dangers from you. I therefore solicited an interview with Brigadier Gen. Lyon, commanding the Federal army in Missouri. It was granted on the 10th inst; waiting all questions of personal and official dignity, I went to St. Louis, accompanied by Major-General Price.

We had an interview on the 11th inst. with General Lyon and Col. F. P. Blair, Jr., at which I submitted to them this proposition: That I would disband the State Guards and break up its organization; that I would disarm all the companies which had been armed by the State; that I would pledge myself not to attempt to organize the militia under the Military Bill; that no arms or munitions of war should be brought into the State; that I would protect all citizens equally in all their rights, regardless of their political opinions; that I would repress all insurrectionary movements within the State; that I would repel all attempts to invade it, from whatever quarter, and by whomsoever made; and that I would thus maintain a strict neutrality in the present unhappy contest, and preserve the peace of the State. And I further proposed that I would, if necessary, invoke the assistance of the U. S. troops to carry out these pledges. All this I proposed to do upon condition that the Federal Government would undertake to disarm the Home Guards which has illegally organized and armed throughout the State, and pledge itself not to occupy with its troops any localities in the State, not occupied by them at this time.

Nothing but the most earnest desire to avert the horrors of civil war from our beloved State, could have tempted me to propose these humiliating terms. They were rejected by the Federal Officers.

They demanded not only the disorganization and disarming of the State militia, and the nullification of the Military Bill, but they refused to disarm their own Home Guards, and insisted that the Federal Government should enjoy an unrestricted right to move and station its troops throughout the State, whenever and wherever that might, in the opinion of its officers, be necessary, either for the protection of the "loyal subjects" or the Federal Government, or for the repelling of invasion; and they plainly announced that it was the intention of the Administration to take military occupation, under these pretenses, of the whole State, and to reduce it, as avowed by General Lyon himself, to the "exact condition of Maryland."

The acceptance by me of these degrading terms, would not only have sullied the honor of Missouri, but would have aroused the indignation of every brave citizen, and precipitated the very conflict which it has been my aim to prevent. We refused to accede to them, and the conference was broken up.

Fellow citizens: All our efforts towards conciliation have failed. We can hope nothing from the justice or moderation of the agents of the Federal Government in this State. They are energetically hastening the execution of their bloody and revolutionary schemes for the inauguration of a civil war in your midst; for the military occupation of your State by armed bands of lawless invaders; for the overthrow of your State Government; and for the subversion of those liberties which that Government has always sought to protect; and they intend to exert their whole power to subjugate you, if possible, to the military despotism which has usurped the powers of the Federal Government.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, C. F. JACKSON, Governor of the State of Missouri, do, in view of the foregoing facts, and by virtue of the powers vested in me, by the Constitution and laws of this Commonwealth, issue this my Proclamation, calling the Militia of the State, to the number of FIFTY THOUSAND, into the active service of the State, for the purpose of repelling said invasion, and for the protection of the lives, liberty, and property of the citizens of this State. And I earnestly exhort all good citizens of Missouri to rally under the flag of their State for the protection of their endangered homes and firesides, and for the defense of their most sacred rights and dearest liberties.

In issuing this Proclamation, I hold it to be my solemn duty to remind you that Missouri is still one of the United States; that the Executive Department of the State Government does not arrogate to itself the power to disturb that relation; that that power has been wisely vested in a Convention which will, at the proper time, express your sovereign will; and that meanwhile it is your duty to obey all the constitutional requirements of the Federal Government. But it is equally my duty to advise you that your first allegiance is one to your own state; and that you are under no obligation, whatever, to obey the unconstitutional edicts of the military despotism which has enthroned itself at Washington, nor to submit to the infamous and degrading sway of its wicked minions in this State. No brave and true-hearted Missourian will obey the one or submit to the other. Rise, then, and drive out ignominiously the invaders who have dared to desecrate the soil which your labors have made fruitful, and which is consecrated by your homes!

Given under my hand as Governor, and under the great seal of the State of Missouri, at Jefferson City, this twelfth day of June, 1861.

Louisville four head of Herefords, one yearling and three calves eight months of age each. Only one was entered in a prize ring, Barrington 6th, and he walked away with a ribbon. Following the show Barrington was sold for \$300. One of the calves was injured in transportation to Louisville and was sold at private sale, the three calves having averaged \$236 each. twenty-four members of the company escaping. Fifty-eight are reported to have been killed. The company was at breakfast when attacked and made a determined resistance, but the overwhelming numbers of the insurgents compelled them to retreat. Of the survivors, who have arrived at Bassay, eleven are wounded. According to the latest returns, the strength of the company was seventy-two. The survivors include Captain Thomas W. Connell, First Lieutenant Edward A. Bumpus and Doctor R. S. Griswold, surgeon. Captain Edwin V. Bookmiller of the Ninth Infantry reports that General Hughes is assembling a force to attack the insurgents. The insurgents captured all the stores and ammunition of the company and all the rifles except twelve.
