FATHER BRANNON'S LECTURES.

The Noted Pulpit Orator Spends a Week in Lexington.

This has been a week of intellectual and spiritual awakening at the Catholic church. Many people have listened with interest to the daily lectures of the brilliant priest-orator, Father P. F. Brannon, of Weatherford, Texas, who in oratory is to the South what Father Ryan was in poetry.

Father Brannon began his mission work here last Sunday and will conclude the series of lectures to-morrow morning.

The versatility of this priest-orator is notable and his delivery easy and natural. He speaks with a grace that at once captivates the listener, and handles his subject in a scholarly manner that wins for him the attention of the man of learning who is in search of more knowledge. And then there is a Christian earnestness in his talks that tells the glad story of life beyond.

No sores have been made by Father Brannon's visit to Lexington. While he has delivered doctrinal lectures and has given strong reasons for the faith that is in him, he accords to others the right to believe as they please. He is broad in his Christian beliefs, yet a firm advocate of what he considers to be the only true way.

Of course, great good has been accomplished in Catholic circles by the coming of Father Brannon and should he ever visit Lexington again he will find a warm welcome awaiting him.

While in Lexington Father Brannon was the guest of Father Costello, the resident priest in charge of this parish.

Forshay Found Insane.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Judge Smith today ordered a jury to find Edward Forshay, of Kansas City, who was being tried on a charge of murder, insane, and demanded that the man be taken to the asylum for criminal insane at Chester.

The defendant on June 3 shot and killed his wife in the Vernon hotel, after the woman refused to live with him.
