No kind of grain can supersede corn as a special crop for animals, as corn also produces a more valuable proportion of bulky food, its fodder being superior to the straw of other grains, but that oats may be used with advantage sometimes in place of corn rather than sell it, is admitted. To send oats to market means extra labor in cleaning, bagging, hauling and unloading, and these items add to the expense. A bushel of wheat is four pounds heavier than a bushel of corn, and nearly twice as heavy as a bushel of oats. Corn is probably the cheapest food, while oats are sometimes the most expensive.—Agricultural World
