"For an hour we wandered through the hummocky, slushy, steaming streets watching crowds of peasant men and women who had come into town market. The faces of these peasants were broad and dull and coarse. They were clothed in rags; the handkerchiefs on the women's heads were old and spattered with mud; the sheepskin coats were torn and foul. We saw hunger—always hunger—in the weak, shuffling steps of men, in the weary faces of women, in hollow, anemic cheeks of little children. They stood about by hundreds and by thousands in the mud. Scowls and gloomy silence. Only here and there groups would suddenly collect. In an instant hands would wave and voices rise in wild anger. Then the soldiers with their bayonets, or the Cossacks with their whips, would rush in shouting abuse, and the peasants would scatter, scowling, shivering—thinking such thinking is the Russian Revolution."

abuses. He talks principally of Armour, as the largest owner of private cars, who controls a dozen or more lines, owning fruit and meat cars, tank-cattle and even common box-cars—approximately 14,000 in all, representing an investment of \$14,000,000. He tells how Armour & Co. carry not only their own products, but fruits and vegetables for shippers generally, and how much of this side issue is conducted entirely as the expense of the railroads.

The railroads pay for these private cars a "mileage charge," afterwards collecting the freight rate. Although the rental for the cars brings in a handsome interest on the money invested, these big shippers are not satisfied, but turn the screws just the same and squeeze their rates down when their products are carried at a figure far below that which the smaller shipper pays.

"Harry Duckwell, aged 25 years, choked to death early yesterday morning at his home, in the presence of his wife and child. Date Culture in the Southwest.

A new factor in the already rapid reclamation of the desert lands of the west has been found in the date palm. An alkaline soil, intense summer heat and absence of rain, supply the conditions under which dates thrive in their native lands; Arabia, Algeria, Egypt. There are millions of acres of such land in southern Arizona and southeastern California, and within the past few years there has been great activity in the importation and planting of foreign varieties of dates. The commercial demand for dried dates is sufficient to justify the production of them in this country, but it is as a fresh fruit that they hold the greatest promise. That the dry regions of Arizona, which lay for years shimmering in idle whiteness, should produce a palm so graceful and a fruit so luscious was never dreamed of by the thousands who toiled across that country. After a decade or two has passed and the palms have attained to the majesty of age this arid section may offer a vision of fruitful grace that will not prove a mirage.—Dane Coolidge in Sunset Magazine for December.

Productiveness of Missouri Soils.

Columbia, Mo., Dec. 23, 1905. The productiveness of the soil of any state is shown by the average crop yields for a series of years, rather than by the total output of the state. That the soil in Missouri is more productive than most of the other great crop growing states is clearly demonstrated by the official reports of the United States Department of Agriculture, which shows the average production of corn in Missouri during the last four years has been greater than that of any other of the great corn growing states except Illinois. The United States report gives Missouri credit for producing during the last four years 130.4 bushels per acre, or an average yield of 32 1/2 bushels. For the same four years 1902 to 1905, inclusive, the average yield of corn in Iowa, one of the greatest corn states in the union, is only 31 1/2 or one bushel less than an average yield for Missouri. In Nebraska another great corn state during the same period the average yield was only 30.9 bushels per acre, or nearly 2 bushels less than Missouri. In Kansas another border state the average yield was only 26 bushels or 6.8 bushels less than our own farmers produced.

While this official statement shows that Missouri soil and Missouri farmers are equal if not superior to those of other states it also shows that the limit of production of corn and other crops has not yet been reached in Missouri. Many farmers have made average yield during the four years mentioned of from 40 to 80 bushels per acre, and there is no reason why the average yield for the entire state of Missouri should not be increased to at least 40 bushels per acre, if our farmers will apply well established scientific methods in selecting seed and in cultivation, and the use of proper fertilizers.
