An adjourned meeting of the city council was held Monday night to consider the proposition of buying the three lots from G. A. Ransch near the Vandiver livery barn. The main reason for desiring the lots is the inexhaustible supply of water from the well on one of the lots. The city has been pumping water from this well for 40 days and there has been no visible decrease in the water. The council voted unanimously to purchase the lots and the price paid was \$1,200. Mayor Mollenkamp had the water analyzed by chemists in Kansas City and the water is pronounced good, containing properties that are healthy. The board of health of our city passed on the analysis made by the Kansas City men and also recommend the water. The pipe now used in conveying this water to the city reservoir will be put under ground and made a permanent part of the water plant.



PORTUGUESE FARMERS.

Saviors of Portugal are Portugal's new farmers. In the south of the little kingdom a serious attempt is being made to reclaim about 10,000,000 acres, or 44 per cent. of the total area of Portugal. Some energetic people, in combination with the municipal authorities, have set to work in the district of Serpa upon 100,000 acres, dividing it into allotments of 15 acres each and letting it at a nominal rent, calculated according to the estimated value of the land. The highest quit rent is \$3.20 and the lowest 40 cents per allotment, free of local taxes and duties for ten years. A heterogeneous mixture of settlers already has taken possession of their tenements. Carpenters, masons, doctors, chemists, barbers, seamstresses, tailors and beggars figure in the motley crowd. The success of the scheme, as far as it has gone, has stirred the ambition of the residents in a large part of the north of Portugal, where a project on similar lines is being set on foot to bring back into cultivation something like half a million of acres.
