## Death of Miss Eugenia Kriebel.

Died at Pomona, California, Monday morning, Feb. 4, Miss Eugenia Kriebel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kriebel, aged 21 years, 9 months and 22 days.

The sad intelligence was brought early Monday afternoon by a telegram from Miss Kriebel's brother in law, John Sturgis, to her father Frank Kriebel. With her mother Miss Kriebel had gone to California a month ago. She had been suffering for several months with an affection of the throat and of the nervous system, the result of an attack of scarlet fever last winter. She became quite ill on the way, and upon her arrival in California she was found to be suffering with typhoid fever. The disease progressed slowly and no great alarm for her safety was felt until about two weeks ago when she became much worse. From this she rallied quickly and encouraging reports were received until four or five days ago.

The announcement of the death of this happy spirited young woman brought much sadness to a wide circle of friends in this city besides the members of her family by whom she was greatly beloved. Miss Kriebel was educated in the public schools of this city and in Central College, where she was still a student in the department of Music.

The funeral services conducted by Rev. R. B. Briney, were held at the home on East Main street Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Interment in Macdohel Cemetery.

## Death of Mrs. Goodloe.

Died at her home eight miles southwest of Lexington Tuesday morning, Mrs. Matilda Goodloe, aged nearly 93 years. Mrs. Goodloe had been in her usual health until about a week ago when she began to succumb to the feebleness of age.

Mrs. Goodloe was a Miss Duvall and was born near Lexington, Kentucky in 1815. She was twice married, first to a Mr. Waltz and after ward to Robert Goodloe. Mr. and Mrs. Goodloe came to this county and located on the Greenon road in 1850. The present homestead has been in family possession ever since 1852. Mr. Goodloe died twenty four years ago.

The deceased leaves a family of six sons and daughters, as follows: George G. of Odessa; Mrs. Sarah Harris, of Kansas City; Mrs. Lou Flournoy, of near Wellington; Cosby and Milton, with whom she lived on the old home place; and Willis, of this city.

The funeral services were held at the home Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock conducted by Rev. R. T. Mansfield. Interment was made at Greenon at 2 o'clock. Mrs. Goodloe had been a member of the Baptist church for about eighty years and of the Greenon church since her residence in that vicinity fifty five years.

## Death of Mrs. Hoelcher.

Died at her home on Third Street, Thursday night February 7, 1907, Mrs. Frank H. Hoelcher, aged 63 years.

Mrs. Hoelcher was a Miss Arveter and was born in Germany in 1841. Most of her life was spent at Washington, Mo., from where she came with Mr. Hoelcher nearly six years ago.

Besides her husband Mrs. Hoelcher leaves a daughter and four sons; Mrs. Kate Mowe, of Washington, Mo., Will and Gus, of St. Louis, Frank, of Washington and Lewis, of Mississippi.

Mrs. Hoelcher suffered a stroke of paralysis about six months ago, from which she never recovered.

The funeral arrangements have not been made. The body will remain here Friday and Saturday and then be taken to Washington for interment.

## Mr. Moorehead's Appointment.

Announcement has reached here through Frank Bowman's official report that J. B. Moorehead has been appointed by Governor Folk as a member of the State Board of Charities and Corrections. Mr. Moorehead says that the first he knew of it was through a letter from Secretary Bowman informing him of the appointment, which was made without his solicitation.

Mr. Moorehead is a warm supporter

of the policies of the administration, as he was of the candidacy of the Governor. He is a highly competent man for the duties of the office to which he has been appointed; and the labor which he has devoted to public causes and enterprises in a local way may be taken as an index to the service he may be expected to render to a larger public.

There are going to be half a dozen great schools for women in Missouri; let the people of Lexington do all they can to insure that their schools are of this number. There is going to be one great Military Academy in Missouri; let the people see to it that Wentworth is that one.

County Court met in regular session Monday, Feb. 4, all the members present.

Upon petition T. T. Dean was appointed Justice of the Peace of Clay township.

Bounty for wolf scalp ordered paid to Fred P. Carson.

Court ordered that Lexington Water Company be allowed to lay its pipes along county road according to petition.

Court ordered filed road change petitioned for by J. D. Shewalter, proof of notice made and plot filed.

Report made in the matter of the Bricken drainage ditch and objection filed by S. J. Houston. Cause set for trial March 7.

John Taubman filed his final report as County Treasurer, which Court approved.

Final report of Clem Tyree, retiring Recorder of Deeds, was received and approved.

Remonstrance filed by John A. Thompson et al to petition of J. D. Shewalter et al for change of road in Egypt bottom and cause set for hearing at the March term. The road and bridge commission was ordered to survey road petitioned for by J. D. Shewalter et al.

J. K. Gray, appointed by the court to investigate the road matter petitioned for by Stonewall White et al, made report and the matter was taken under advisement until the March term of court.
