Sizing up People.

The art of all arts for the leader is the ability to measure men, to weigh them, to "size them up," to estimate their possibilities, to place them so as to call out their strength and eliminate their weakness.
This is the epitaph which Andrew Carnegie has chosen for himself: "Here lies a man who knew how to get around men much cleverer than himself." People wonder how a Morgan, a Harriman, a Ryan, a Wanamaker, can carry on such prodigious enterprises. The secret lies in their ability to project themselves through a mighty system by being able to choose men who will fit the places they are put in, men who can carry out their employer's programme to the letter. Men who are capable of succeeding in a large way are shrewd enough to know that they do not "know it all," shrewd enough to employ men who are strong where they are weak, to surround themselves with men who have the ability which they lack, who can supplement their weakness and shortcomings with strength and ability. Thus, in their combined power, they make an effective force.

Extra Session Bills.
The following bills, introduced by the persons named, were passed by the Missouri Legislature at its extra session just closed:
Senator Ely—Prohibiting race-track gambling.
Senator Dowell—Prohibiting order houses from storing, selling or delivering intoxicants in local-option counties.
Senator Bradley—Applying the principles of the fellow-servant law to employes in lead, zinc, coal and copper mines.
Senator Kianey—Extending the scope of the State factory inspection law.
Senator Cooper—Empowering cities to regulate public-utility charges.
Senator Humphrey—Empowering the Governor to contract for the collection of any war or land claims that may be due the State from the Government.
Senator Cooper—Amending the law relating to the removal of delinquent officials in action before the Circuit Court, so as to empower the Governor to direct the Attorney General to assist in such cases prosecutions; and also giving appeals in such cases priority in hearing and determination.
Senator Humphrey—Prohibiting manufacturers of intoxicants, their agents or employes from obtaining dramshop license, and permitting two or more citizens to file suits to forfeit the bond of a dramshop keeper guilty of a violation of the law.
Representative Burch—Appropriating \$75,000 for the expenses of the extra session.
Representative Burch—Appropriating about \$3,600,000 for the general expenses of the State government.
Representative Swenzen—Making it a misdemeanor to forge a name to either a dramshop petition or a remonstrance.
Representative Kinney—Regulating demurrage charges in shipments of water-melons.
Representative Carter—Prohibiting the selling or giving away of intoxicants on general and State primary election days between the hours of 5 a.m. and 7 p.m.
Representative Pemberton—Prohibiting the licensing of dramshops within five miles of the State University
