"I think the sheriff had better attend to this," suggested Mr. Young, whereupon Scott made a break for the door. He went down Eleventh street to the alley, then west to Highland avenue and came back to town. Meanwhile Mr. Young had called up Sheriff Kinkadee. The negro was arrested without difficulty and taken before Justice Hicklin, who fined him \$15. Had he obtained the money, the penalty would probably have been a term in the penitentiary.
