**Criminal Court.**

In the criminal court Saturday Quant Fry, the Wellington negro who was sentenced to one year in jail last fall for trying to kill his step-son was paroled for the remainder of his term.

Chas. Lyons was appointed by the court to defend Arnold Walker.

Tim Hawkins entered a plea of guilty of grand larceny, was sentenced to two years in the reform school and paroled.

Ernest Clark entered a plea of guilty of burglary and was sentenced to three years in the reform school.

In the case of the State of Mo. vs. August Starke, defendant files deposition of Bernia Thomas. Case dismissed.

State vs. Tim Hawkins, defendant enters plea of guilty of grand larceny, sentenced to two years in the reform school and paroled.

State vs. Littlejohn, continued at the cost of defendant and set for trial, June 11, 1908.

The criminal court took up four cases Thursday.

The case of City of Higginsville vs. Richard Kirtley, charged with drunkenness, appealed from justice of peace court, was tried by jury and resulted in a disagreement. The next trial was set for June 10.

In the case of State vs. Walter Warner, scire facias and alias capias papers were ordered issued and the case was continued until the June term at the cost of the defendant.

John Kueck was tried by jury for felonious assault and acquitted.

The case of City of Higginsville vs. O. A. Jones was continued at cost of defendant until the June term, 1908.
