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### LIBERTY H. S. WAS EASY

Wentworth Takes First Game by Overwhelming Score.

Handing a ball, slippery with mud and rain, upon a field which rendered cleats almost useless, in a drizzling rain which beat upon the players' headgears and dripped into their eyes were the conditions that surrounded the Wentworth-Liberty inaugural game Saturday on the academy gridiron, during the course of which the cadets plunged through the Liberty boys like a snowplough through a drift and walked away with their initial game by the decisive score of 61 to 0. The rain began coming down about thirty minutes before the game and the contest started while the elements were still raging. Mass-play was the only kind that could be done perfectly, but nevertheless the cadets attempted end runs very often and usually got away with them. The end runs would have netted twice as many yards under ordinary conditions but the field proved to be the cadets' worst enemy and the man with the ball usually hit the turf several times before being tackled. Two forward passes were attempted and the ball was so difficult to handle and throw accurately that both were unsuccessful.

Wentworth received the ball on the kickoff and by several end runs coupled with a few line rushes, carried the ball to within 10 yards of Liberty's goal. The ball was lost on a fumble, but was quickly recovered and touchdowns were in vogue during the remaining minutes of the half. Wentworth took the ball on all kickoffs and usually it took very few downs to land the ball on the opposite side of the goalposts. The Wentworth line hammered the opposing forces incessantly and was effective at all times. The light and speedy backs skirted the ends with consistent success. Conklin, the small but husky fullback, plunged through the line easily for gains, while Cook II, Owens and Hillix shot around the ends at intervals with ever-increasing success. The cadets were not forced to punt during the entire game. The Liberty boys held the ball for three downs on two occasions. The first half ended 32 to 0.

In the second half there were no changes in regard to the game being a walkaway. There were several changes in the lineup, however, in order to give the entire squad a chance to mix. End runs were used almost exclusively with a few line plunges thrown in and these plays netted in all another 31 points. The final score was 61 to 0.

The football followers were decidedly satisfied with the playing of the cadet machine in the curtain raiser of the season. Next Saturday the cadets will tackle something that is worthy of consideration, William Jewel. They will be fighting all the time to beat and you can bet on that.
