GAME CANCELLED

An Eleventh Hour Backdown By William Jewell's Coach.

It transpired that after Wentworth had completed arrangements for the William Jewell college game, Coach Brummage Saturday detects a flaw in Wentworth's contract and cancelled the game. Let it be understood that this game was to have been played on Mr. Brummage's initiative. He asked for the game and was given his choice of dates which was Oct. 3. Mr. Brummage submitted his list of eligibles and in Wentworth's reply an exact copy was submitted. All of this took place in due time but on the last day and at the last minute Mr. Brummage detected an omission in Wentworth's contract. Because the words "never have played on any college team" did not appear in Wentworth's contract, Brummage refused to play the game. However the authorities at Wentworth supplied this omission over the phone and to make double sure that this technicality be removed, Col. Hoge sent a telegram to the effect that no member of the cadet team had ever played on a college team. He declined to accept either of these certificates and cancelled the game.

There can be but one inference and that is, Mr. Brummage was afraid to risk his professional ability as a coach of the William Jewell college team in a game with the cadets.

A graduate of William Jewell at Liberty informed Wentworth that Brummage left last night for Lawrence, Kansas. Possibly his business in Lawrence was more important than carrying out his agreement with Wentworth.

Pleasant relations have always existed between William Jewell and Wentworth and this occurrence is to be regretted. William Jewell would do well if she aims to maintain her good name in the athletic world by discarding a man so lacking in a sense of moral obligation as Mr. Brummage.
