Miss Patti Louisa Rosa should have a natural equipment for stage work, as both her mother and grandmother were footlight favorites of more than ordinary degree. The young lady is a daughter of the Jolly Patti Rosa, remembered with much affection by the majority of the amusement loving public, and Patti Rosa was a daughter of Madam Cerito, a famous figure on the Italian stage in the last generation. Skill in dancing was a great gift in common with all three of the family.

Madam Cerito was the greatest premier danseuse of her day, and she had the reputation of being able to make more changes in costume with greater celerity than any premier before or since. She had a dozen or more characteristic dances and a different presentation with each. Madam Cerito put her daughter on the stage when the afterwards famous Patti Rosa was a child 4 years old. Patti Louisa Rosa has inherited much of her mother's charm and grace. She has only been on the stage five years, and in that time has made an enviable reputation with numerous farce comedy productions.
