The School Entertainment

The pupils of the Lexington public schools gave their annual entertainment Friday evening at Geyer's Grand Opera house. The entertainment was unusually successful from a financial point of view and most of those present seemed to enjoy it.

The program was arranged in two parts, the first being participated in by the children selected from the 1st to the 7th grades. This was a pleasing little fantasy adapted from the Mother Goose tales, and was a dramatization of the old, old story of the Three Bears. In this sketch there were four principal characters—the three bears and Peggy, who meddles and gets caught. The other children were brought in as fairies representing knitting needles, clover leaves and daisies and dishes, spoons and buttons according to their size. It was a very pleasing little number and met with warm applause.

The Three Bears was only a preliminary to the feature of the show. This of course was the High school play. The piece selected this time for the closing entertainment was a song of Greece, "The Princess" a dramatized poem by Alfred Tennyson. It was a difficult thing to handle; but the cast, especially the girls, who were aided by their Psyche knots, all performed capably. There were many musical numbers interjected and some of these were very pretty. Misses Mary Berrie, Estelle Cullum, Anna Wood Eggleston, Lola Frazier and Nellie Price; and Ben Price, Irvin Morris, Fall Becker, Reed Moreland and Arthur Kriebel were cast in the principal parts.

Julius Coe Dead.

Julius G. Coe, editor of the Higginsville Jeffersonian, died at his home in Higginsville shortly afternoon Sunday. Death was due to paralysis and a complication of diseases came after an illness of several months. About two weeks ago he was taken home from a Kansas City hospital and it was understood then that his chances for recovery were very slight.

Mr. Coe was one of the most widely known country newspaper men of Missouri. He was born September 24, 1859, in Rockingham County, North Carolina, and was the youngest of five children of Rev. John Coe of the Episcopal church. After his graduation from Reidsville, North Carolina, College in 1876 Mr. Coe entered the printing business. Four years later he came to Missouri and founded the Johnson County Star at Warrensburg. In 1884 he changed his residence to Odessa and then conducted the Odessa Democrat and later the Odessa Moon. Several years ago he purchased the Higginsville Jeffersonian and edited and managed that paper successfully until his illness overcame him.

He leaves three children. The funeral was held in the Methodist church of Higginsville tomorrow afternoon. Burial was in the Odessa cemetery.

Death of T. J. Whitley.

T. J. Whitley, an old resident of Lexington, died Saturday morning at three o'clock at his home on the river front. Mr. Whitley had been an invalid for many years and since his wife was killed by a passing freight train about a year ago, he has been declining steadily. His death was due to a cancer.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon. He was 64 years old and was a Civil war veteran.
