The big feature next Saturday at Geyer's Grand Opera House will be the Fraser Highlanders, Toronto's brilliant Concert Band of Scottish musicians. These men are selected from the crack Banas of Canada and are every one artists of high merit in the musical line. Many of the people of Lexington have never seen a Scottish Band arrayed in the historical costumes of its country and to those it will be a spectacular as well as a musical treat.

The costumes of the different Clans of Scotland are quite varied and picturesque, that of the Clan Fraser being far the most gorgeous. It consists of a plaided skirt called the kilt, which is worn instead of trousers, reaching just to the knees. The Fraser Kilt is a beautiful combination of reds and browns, over which is worn a scarlet jacket trimmed in bands of white; an ornamented belt around the waist from which is suspended the sporran or purse which is highly ornamented, in this costume, very expensively. A long shawl-like scarf called the plaid is thrown across the shoulders diagonally, and this together with the short plaided hose, low shoes and spats and the rakish Scotch cap, decked with the historic Plantagenet feather, make a widely picturesque and strikingly romantic dress. This is called the Hunting Fraser Tartan and the Concert Band is arrayed in this while the pipers and dancers wear the Dress Fraser Tartan which is still more elaborate.
