## CADETS BEAT RICHMOND

### Even With Bunch Pitching the Elks Lost 12 to 1.

The Wentworth base ball team won its eighth consecutive victory Monday by defeating the Richmond Elks 12 to 1. The Elks always bring over a strong team and one in which they believe. This year was no exception. They loaded up with Bunch, a pitcher of state-wide reputation and with such old stars as Gibson, Taylor, Young and Owens they thought they would have an easy time; but they figured that the cadet team was just a little better than last year.

Joe Hruska was the main show. He allowed only one hit and let only 31 Richmondites face him. In no inning except the first and the fourth did a visitor get on base; and in the fourth only one man got into the diamond. The Joe, to show that he had some versatility, made three hits out of four times up, gleaning a home run and a three bagger.

Wilson, the cadet center fielder, made a pretty diving catch, which resulted in a double play. Randolph and Magee made repeated spectacular stops of grounders.

At the bunting game the cadets showed up well. They beat out many easy taps, and occasionally to vary the monotony clouted the ball to the outfield. John Hruska once got a two bagger with three men on bases.

The Richmond team did fair work at times, though after the first, inning the spectators saw that the cadets had the game pocketed. Young got the one hit in the first. Several times, however, the visitors showed a lack of team work and allowed hits to the cadets which a heady team would have cut off.

The court met Monday in regular session with Presiding Judge Z. W. Wright, Judge J. F. Rolf, Judge J. F. Larkin, Clerk C. L. Glascock and Sheriff W. S. Peacock present. The session lasted three days and the following business was disposed of:

\$31,000 county compromise bonds were called to be paid July 1.

The court ordered the clerk to make requisition on the state auditor for \$100.00, the amount due for county superintendent's salary.

The court approved contract for improvements at the poor farm.

The court approved contract for building two bridges on the Fallman road.

The court ordered that \$33.00 be allowed B. F. Cox for land condemned for road purposes.

A dram shop license was granted Hugo Buddemyer at Napoleon.

The court ordered that voting precinct be established in Sec. 6, Township 48, Range 27 to be known as the East Odessa precinct in Washington township.

The court ordered that County Highway Engineer, John Walker, have two bridges repaired in Odessa special road district No. 2.

The contracts for four bridges were let and are as follows: One near the Bell Graves farm on township line between

& 50, range 27, one near E. S. Anderson Sec. 25, 49-26, and one 1/2 miles southeast of Odessa in Sec. 21-28, 48 27.
