# PATENTS

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## Washington Letter.

Now that the people have come to see the sham of a high tariff, and to understand that a continuation of Republican rule means a still further surrender of the government to the trust plunderbund, the G. O. P. orators and newspapers are trying to raise the spectre of hard times, and to make it appear that business will falter in the event of Democratic success.

Such imbecilities never weary the Republican mind. Without regard to the truth, and unimpressed by evidence to the contrary, these men go on shouting the same old heresies. The "hard times" heresy is a twin brother to the long exploded doctrine that a high protective tariff protects American workmen, when every school boy in the land knows that it does no such thing.

A brief review of recent American business depression provides a full and sufficient answer to these foolish arguments. The last panic in this country occurred less than five years ago, when all the machinery of government was in full control of the Republicans, and when Theodore Roosevelt, who has a cure for all known political evils, was in the White House. This panic was the least excusable the nation ever endured.

The Republican party was in full control of the government when the panic of 1883 came about. Likewise, this party was in power when there came a panic in the early part of 1884, and the country recovered from that panic during the campaign that resulted the election of Mr. Cleveland. The Republican party was in full control of the government for the four years previous to the panic of 1883, which was a currency panic clearly due to the passage, by the Republicans of the Silver Purchase act of 1890. This law so depleted the gold reserve in the national treasury that a few millions in gold were borrowed by the government in New York, in order to keep the treasury reserve up to \$100,000,000 until the Harrison administration could get out of office, and thus make it appear that the panic was due to the incoming Democratic administration.

The silver panic of 1893, which was entirely due to the Republican legislation, is the only one for more than half a century that did not occur while the Republicans were in full possession of the government. Yet Republican orators and newspapers, true to their habit of hiding the facts and raising false issues, go right ahead trying to make it appear that the Democratic party is the party of hard times.

This is the heresy of the pronounced kind, and it is safe to assume that the country will appraise it at its true work. The time is passed when the voters can be fooled. They are demanding the truth and what is more important, they are showing the ability to separate the truth from the false.

### The Big Issue.

United States Senator LaFollette, in the closing chapter of his autobiography, which has been running in the American magazine and which soon is to be published in book form, gives what he considers to be the one big issue now confronting the American people. He says:

"In twenty-five years of political struggle I have found one great issue overshadowing all others—the encroachment of the powerful few on the rights of the many. All the issues of today are phrases of this one great question. How shall the

individual, the farmer, the worker, and all those who pay tribute, be set free from the unjust exactions of the tariff, the railroads, and other forms of oppression by special interests.

Then Roosevelt became president the total stock and bond issues of the trusts was \$784,000,000. When he turned the country over to Taft this total had grown to \$31,672,000,000 seventy per cent of which is water.

"The people of this country are paying dividends on all this watered stock, in the form of unnecessarily high prices for the things they eat, use and wear."

### How "Dissolution" Helps.

The Standard Oil company's profit figures for the six months since January first—the first six months of operation under the terms of the Supreme Court's dissolution decree—show that the trust has piled up profits of \$46,611,628. Last year the Standard Oil company of New Jersey the corporation which distributed dividends for the trust, paid out profits of \$39,335,320.

Thus it is apparent that "dissolution" suits are highly beneficial to such law defying monopolies as the Standard Oil company.

### Wilson's Broad Appeal.

The practical wisdom of Governor Wilson's nomination is asserting itself more every day. Of all the men that were available for the Democratic nomination, none were so well fortified as the New Jersey governor to meet the requirements of the country and the party.

That he has the confidence of the business interests is shown by the fact that his nomination did not cause the slightest disturbance in the financial centers that are supposed to be barometers of the business welfare.

All the big corporations are working almost to the limit of their capacity. The Baldwin locomotive works of Philadelphia, which employs 15,000 men in one plant, announced within the week that it would work to capacity for a year to come on present orders.

Every day sees the conversion of influential republicans to the governor's allegiance, notable among whom is C. R. Crane the Chicago millionaire who long supported Roosevelt.

Added to favorable signs the government crop reports point to a bumper yield, so it would seem that even Providence approved the selection of the noted Princeton man to lead the Democratic hosts to victory.
