The August American Magazine. The August American Magazine is a fiction number and leads off with the first installment of a new serial by Inez Haynes Gillmore entitled "Angel Island." Mrs. Gillmore is the author of the celebrated "Phoebe and Ernest" stories. The scene of this new story is laid on an uninhabited island where, owing to a shipwreck, five men are stranded and there put to work out their problem under primitive conditions. In the course of the story five women are to be introduced into the community and the tale is to center around the solution under the various difficulties that arise. Mrs. Gillmore is an ardent suffragist, and while in her new story the romance is always paramount, the story symbolizes the whole feminist movement with a vividness, a concreteness, impossible in the most ably written narrative of fact.

John A. Moroso writes a remarkable short story having to do with a fire in a skyscraper. John Taintor Foote writes a horse race story; and William Hawley Smith contributes a rat story. George Fitch, Stephen Leacock and James Montgomery Flagg—all humorous writers—present stories and sketches.

Hugh S. Fullerton contributes "The Making of a Big Leaguer"; David Grayson writes another "Adventure in Contentment"; an anonymous writer describes her experiences saving her husband from drink; Mateel Howe Farnham records her experiences with a Japanese servant; and Ellsworth and Emery Kolb, famous Southwestern photographers, present in pictures the story of their adventures while passing through the rapids of the Grand Canyon and the Colorado River.

Still Silver-Tongued.

The spectacle of a Cabinet member delivering lectures for money is not pleasing. It suggests a mercenary spirit; it indicates a want of appreciation of that excellent quality of dignity which even the most rampant democratic mind likes to find in public men.

His explanation that he cannot live on his salary, which is \$12,000 a year, smacks of untruthfulness. We need not refer to the fact that he had not the good taste to quit the publication of his Commoner when he became a public servant, and that that journal is supposed to be a profitable enterprise.

Perhaps, however, we take Mr. Bryan a bit too seriously.

Nothing is clearer, or has been for many a year, than that the Nebraskan is afflicted with the malady of talk. It may be that his surprising statement that he needs the money is merely a subterfuge, by means of which he wishes to conceal the fact that he simply cannot check the torrent of his verbosity.—St. Louis Times.

Somebody asked Herman Siedcken, the greatest coffee expert in the country, what kind of coffee was best and his reply was: "All kinds of coffee are good, if you will use enough of them." Perhaps this accounts for the popularity of coffees from so many different lands. General Grant used to say he thought Mexico produced the finest coffee in the world. Experts always have sung the praises of Brazilian coffee and the favorite sign of the restaurant people is "Best French coffee." During the Cuban War, many of our army officers were loud in praise of Porto Rico coffee. Perhaps as a result of the popularity it thus obtained, our imports of Porto Rico coffee have been increasing constantly. The bean is small and its aroma very pronounced. Americans are the greatest coffee drinkers in the world and with all these sources to draw upon, for a limitless supply, there is no fear that their demands will not always be met.—Leslie's Weekly.

Making the Best of It.

The Senate Finance Committee proposes to reduce the basic exemption of the income tax from \$4,000 to \$3,000. This is a step in the right direction. As a principle of taxation, we have not favored the income tax. When, however, it became inevitable that we were to have such a tax, our contention was that all the exemptions proposed were too high, that if the proposition is to be free from the charge of class legislation it should be made to apply to the largest possible number. Along this line we commended, in a recent issue,

the Wisconsin law which its basic exemption of \$800 for a single person as compared with the \$4,000 exemption proposed in the House of Representatives, and quoted State Senator Bosshard of Wisconsin who declares that the income tax in that State has helped already to make better citizens by producing in many who were compelled to pay the tax an interest in the work of public officials they did not have before.

A Wisconsin reader takes us to task for supposing that any form of taxation could awake any other feeling but antagonism on the part of those compelled to pay it, and states that such is the feeling of all those with whom he has conversed on the subject. This statement our readers may put in contrast with the opposite view announced by State Senator Bosshard. The rule that one is interested in that into which he has put his money is applicable not only to one's private financial affairs but also to the investment a citizen is compelled to make in the State through the payment of taxes. The taxpayer who doesn't show an interest in the way his taxes are used by public officials is not alive to his full duty as a citizen. State Senator Bosshard says that the income tax has had the effect of creating such an interest in Wisconsin, especially among those not accustomed heretofore to paying taxes.—Leslie's Weekly.
