MOLASSES KILLED SEA FISH

100,000 Gallons Pumped into Water of a San Domingo Port Did Immense Damage.

More than 100,000 gallons of molasses were recently pumped overboard at Macoria, according to officers of the British bark Sunlight, which arrived recently from the San Domingo port with 400,000 gallons of molasses in bulk. The sailors said that the great quantity of molasses when thrown overboard made the water so thick that the fish were unable to swim in it and died by hundreds.

The square rigger was 16 days coming up from Macoria. The officers said that not enough vessels could be secured to carry the molasses crop away from San Domingo, and in order to make room for this year's crop it was necessary to pump more than 100,000 gallons of perfectly good molasses into the harbor. The Sunlight was anchored in the harbor when the molasses was pumped over. The water, the sailors said, looked as dark as coal. Several of the seamen were furious and jumped overboard for a swim. They did not expect to find the water sticky, but they did and were glad when hauled out by several companions.

The sweet and sticky stuff must have attracted thousands of fish, for hundreds of large dead fish came to the surface of the molasses water soon after the 100,000 gallons had been pumped into the harbor.

SHEARED HIS FLOWING LOCKS

British Statesman Recently the Victim of New Barber and His Own Absentmindedness.

A few weeks ago the members of the British house of commons gasped with amazement when Premier Asquith, whose hair has always been of a dignified length, entered the chamber basifullly from behind the speaker's chair and revealed that his locks had been shorn as closely as those of one of Oliver Cromwell's "Round-heads."

At first it was thought that the premier had adopted a new and more fashionable method of "doing" his hair, but it now transpires that he did not willingly sacrifice his flowing locks. He, as much as anyone else, was greatly perturbed when he discovered his loss.
