one agent in every county of Missouri to handle the prison binder twine was amended by striking out the provision giving the warden the appointing power. The amendment adopted allows anybody that wants to handle state twine the right to do so if he meets the requirements.

Representative Farris has introduced a bill giving sheriff's 75 cents a day board for prisoners.

A second bill relating to probate judge has been introduced. It requires that probate judges be lawyers.

The republican members are playing politics by yelling entrenchment. To one in touch with the situation their cry is a joke. Especially is this true as in the Legislature of 1909, which was republican, there were 420 employees in the House, against 192 in the present democratic house.

State Treasurer Deal in his report charges his democratic colleagues with having expended more money than was spent under the Hadley administration. His charge is a "tempest in a teapot." The answer hurled back by the other democratic state officials is that Deal tell the truth. It is not unlikely Treasurer Deal in the next few days will issue a supplemental report correcting his first report. In his first report he simply printed the increased expense

necessary without crediting the increased receipts realized by the increased expense. His corrected report is expected early next week.

Representative Houx has introduced a bill for taxing all dogs, the destruction of dangerous and sheep killing dogs, and the establishment of dog kennels for the breeding of a better and more servicable class of dogs. Under the bill on all dogs over six months old a tax of \$1 per year is taxed payable to the county clerk, who shall keep a correct record thereof. Every dog so licensed shall have a collar around his neck, properly stamped indicating the year for which the taxes have been paid. Dangerous and sheep killing dogs are not allowed to run at large, the fee of \$2 each being allowed marshals and constables for every untaxed dog killed. Persons owning dogs and not complying with the license law, are punishable by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50. In addition the bill provides for the establishment of State Dog Kennels under the control of the State Board of Agriculture. This board shall procure good and useful dogs for breeding purposes as may be most advantageous for the promotion of the agricultural and other interests of the State, no fee being charged for the service of stud dogs. Only the kindest and most useful dogs are to be raised, and when six months old, are to be distributed free to persons in each county

applying. In other words the distribution is similar to that of fish and quail, being furnished free to those applying. One-half of the license tax money is turned over to the state treasurer and the other one-half is paid to the treasurer of St. Louis and each county treasurer to be applied to the good roads fund. If this bill is passed, in a few years there will be no useless and worthless dogs in Missouri, and in addition, every dog owner will help the popular good roads movement throughout the State.

She was 63 years old, is survived by her husband, four daughters and three sons. Burial was in the old family burying ground at Mayview yesterday. The family formerly resided in Lexington, where one son, Andrew, died about six months ago.

GIRLS EARN THEIR WAY AT COLLEGE

Seventy-five Young Women of University of Missouri Make More Than "Pin" Money.

Girls can earn their way through college.

Altogether there are between seventy-five and a hundred young women who are paying all or a part of their expenses at the University of Missouri.

The employment bureau of the Y. W. C. A. has calls from many Columbia homes asking for girls who want to work. This work consists of caring for children, serving formal dinners, doing general housework, cleaning, dusting, darning hose and common sewing.

For sewing girls receive 25 cents an hour; housework generally pays only 15 cents. Students holding half-time stenographic positions in the University are paid 25 cents an hour. Other stenographic work is done by the page. Tutoring brings 50 cents an hour.

Girls working their way at the University are of general opinion that the effort expended is worth while and that they need loose very little social life. Some even declare that they gain valuable experience which the girl whose expenses are paid by her family can never obtain.
