COST OF PUBLIC EDUCATION

United States Pays Out Many Millions of Dollars for the Benefit of Future Citizens.

In round numbers there were 22,000,000 persons enrolled in educational institutions in the United States in 1914, according to the annual report of the United States commissioner of education. Of these, more than 19,000,000 were in elementary schools, 1,374,000 in secondary schools, both public and private, and 216,000 in colleges and universities.

Close to another 100,000 were in normal schools, preparing to be teachers; 67,000 were in professional schools, and the remainder were scattered through other types of institutions. The teachers for this educational army numbered 700,000, of whom 566,000 were in public schools. In point of rapid growth, the public high school still presents the most impressive figures; the enrollment for 1914 is greater by over 84,000 than for the year before.

The cost of education for the year, as estimated by the bureau, was \$750,000,000. "This amount is a relatively small sum when compared with other items in the public expense," declares the report. "It is less by \$300,000,000 than the cost of running the federal government; it is only a little more than three times the estimated cost of admissions to moving picture theaters in the United States for the same year."

PUTTING HENS TO NOVEL USE

German Would Train Them to Announce Aeroplanes' Approach, Is Report.

The London Daily Chronicle republishes from the Cologne Gazette an odd article on the use of animals to signify the approach of enemy aeroplanes.
