

## ATHLETICS CLEANED HOUSE SUNDAY

### In a Game of Many Thrills—Howe Won Game With Timely Blow.

With the count knotted, the Athletics last bat and with two men on the bags, two men out and two strikes on 'em, with the crowd holding their breath, the Athletics graceful first sacker proved himself equal to the occasion and sent the ball soaring to the left field fence, sending Lineback home with the winning run.

The above was merely the finish of Sunday's brilliant baseball battle at Athletic park, in which the local team beat the Kansas City Fords, one of the strongest aggregations around the City. The combat was the best seen here this season, and one of the best in several years. It was one of those thrilling games that kept the crowd on their toes every minute of the nine innings, the score being tied twice and the team in the lead never had a margin of more than one run.

Kansas City was the first to score. In the second frame, Lorfing, the Ford's third sacker, got a homer over the left field fence. The locals tied the score in their half on a couple of hits and an error. They took the lead in the third when Carmichael singled and scored on Lineback's hit. In the fifth chapter, after Miller doubled, Bertie lifted another over the left field barrier and put the "tin lizzies" in the lead. But the old lucky seventh, the locals again forged ahead by putting two over. These were manufactured with a double by Harding, a single by Carmichael and another single by Lineback.

Then came the ninth spasm, the one in which each team put one over. The visitor's first man up fled to Lineback. Lorfing walked and was thrown out when Miller hit to Amos. Bowman then doubled, scoring Miller, again sewing up the game.

The heavy hitters were up for the domestics. Lineback singled, his fourth hit of the game, Mackie followed with a single sending Lineback to second, Stevens then sacrificed, the runners advancing, Howe then got his timely blow, Lineback racing

home with the deciding run. Carmichael heaved the pill for the Athletics, and proved to some of Lexington's fickle fans that he has got something on the ball, because the Kansas City Fords haven't any High School boys on the team. He was invincible in the pinches and although several home runs have been gotten off Carmichael this season, they always come when two are out and the bases empty. He allowed 7 hits and struck out ten men. House, a former Detroit pitcher, who has quited a "rep" in the city was touched for eight safeties and he also whiffed ten. The hits off the opposing hurlers were about even, but Carmichael's was scattered and the Athletic's bunched their blows off House.

Drummond Brown, a former Kansas City Federal League catcher, did the receiving for Lexington. Howard Shinn, the regular, was on the sick list. This was Brown's first game this season, and he was not in the best of shape, but caught an excellent game and made the Athletic's first tally.

Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Saunders and two children went to Kansas City Friday for a few days' visit.



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
