What About the Hessian Fly?
1. Question. Can the Hessian
fly be controlled?
Answer. Yes. If the wheat
is sown soon or soon after the
fly-free date. For the northern
third of Missouri the date is
about October 1; central third,
October 8; and southern third,
October 16.

2. Question. Well, you are
wrong there because I sowed my
wheat on October 15 last fall
and I live in Boone county and
this year there were many Hes-
sian flies in my wheat field.
How can you explain this?
Answer. Your wheat went
through the fall and winter
practically free from injury by
the Hessian fly, because the
wheat came up after nearly all
the adult flies were dead. You
noticed no injury by the fly this
spring until the last of April.
The Hessian flies that destroyed
your wheat crop came from
early sown fields of wheat or
volunteer wheat within a mile of
your wheat field, and this early
sown wheat or volunteer wheat
showed fly injury last fall.

3. Question. You are right
my neighbor just across the
road sowed his wheat last fall
on September 25 and the flies
damaged it badly last fall, but
what can I do?
Answer. Organize your neigh-
borhood and co-operate with
every wheat grower in your
community in putting into prac-
tice the measures that will con-
trol the pest. If possible get
all your neighbors to destroy
their volunteer wheat and delay
sowing until the fly-free date.

Write to the College of Agricul-
ture, University of Missouri,
Columbia, Missouri, for a post-
er bulletin telling how to control
the Hessian fly. Post where
your neighbors can see it, as
unless they fight the fly with
you, their flies may kill your
wheat.

NOW IS TIME TO
FIGHT HESSIAN FLY
Keep Down Volunteer Wheat
and Sow After Fly-free
Dates.
On account of the dry weather
but few adult Hessian flies
have emerged from infested
wheat stubble, says T. J. Tal-
bert of the College of Agricul-
ture of the University of Mis-
souri.

The pest may still be found
in the old wheat stubble in the
flaxseed stage, when it can be
destroyed by plowing and har-
rowing.

If the plowing is done in Sep-
tember, special pains should be
taken to work the ground into a
compact and firm seed bed. This
will prevent the fly from escap-
ing and the wheat will make a
much better growth during the
fall and early winter.

"Don't fail to keep down the
volunteer wheat which will soon
start on the plowed ground,"
advises Mr. Talbert. "The de-
struction of volunteer wheat
starves the fly. Remember that
the food plants of the Hessian
fly are wheat, rye and barley
and that none of these crops
should be sown after the fly-
free date, which is for northern
third of Missouri, October 1;
for the central third, October 8;
and for the southern third, Oc-
tober 16. These are the safe
sowing dates and they should
be observed in order to escape
injury from the Hessian fly."

A united fight should be made
against the fly, according to Mr.
Talbert, because if one farmer
sows his wheat early or fails to
keep down volunteer wheat, he
may let enough flies live over
winter in his early wheat to
come out in the spring and de-
stroy his own crop and the
wheat crops of his neighbors
who may have sown their wheat
on or after the fly-free date. In
the spring the fly comes from
early sown wheat and volunteer
wheat.
