Springfield Youth Probably the Youngest Soldier in American Army at Present.

## JOPLIN BUYS LIBERTY BONDS

Commissioners of City Appropriate \$55,000 From the Various City Funds for the Purpose.

With Battery F, Sixth Artillery, Douglas, Ariz., is Private E. F. Hannah, Jr., 13 years old, and E. F. Hannah, Sr., of Springfield, claims he is the father of the youngest American soldier. About six weeks ago young Hannah applied and was accepted at the Springfield recruiting station. He was sent to Jefferson Barracks. His father secured his release. The next day the youth ran away and went to Tulsa. A relative saw him at the recruiting office there. The result was his return to Springfield. May 1 young Hannah disappeared. Recently his father received a message saying he was an artilleryman.

"I'll make no attempt to get him back now," Hannah said. "I guess he is the kind the army needs, even if he lacks five years of the required age."

The city of Joplin, after three years of commission government, had so much money in its treasury that the commissioners voted to subscribe for \$50,000 worth of the Liberty Loan bonds. The police department appropriated \$3,000 from its relief fund and the fire department \$2,000 from its relief fund for a similar purchase. Each of the funds was created under commission rule. When the commissioners took charge three years ago there was only a little more than \$5,000 in the general fund, from which all expenses of a general nature are paid.

**Lightning Killed Montgomery Man.**  
During a thunderstorm at Jonesburg, near Montgomery, lightning struck George Nelson's barn, killing Ed Wells. Nelson also was injured, but will recover.

**Rage Fatal to Missourian.**  
Emery Engle, 22 years old, quarreled with his wife and while in a rage beat a shotgun over a fence. The weapon was discharged and the charge took effect in his abdomen and he died ten minutes later.

**Missouri to Have "Can Day."**  
"Can Conservation Day" has been declared in Missouri for Friday, June 22. Jewell Mayes, secretary of the state board of agriculture, has sent out a statewide appeal urging that every glass can, every wide-mouthed bottle, every stoneware or crockery or porcelain vessel that can be sealed with a top, or a cork, or a wooden plug, or paraffin or sealing wax, be recovered and put in shape to be "food cartridges." The increase of canning clubs is urged also.

**Epworth League Meet at McCredie.**  
H. B. McIntyre of Fulton, president of the Epworth League for the Mexico district, announced that the annual convention will be held at McCredie on June 19 and 20.

**Missouri Bankers Elect.**  
Officers were elected at the closing session of the Missouri Bankers' Association at St. Joseph as follows: W. B. Sanford, Springfield, president; F. T. Hodgeson, Hannibal, vice president; W. L. Buschle, Kansas City, treasurer; W. F. Keyser, Sedalia, secretary; E. P. Neef, Sedalia, assistant secretary.

**Three Killed by Train.**  
John Dowling, Edward Carroll and James Ryan, all farmers, were instantly killed recently four miles north of Hannibal, when struck by Burlington Passenger Train No. 15, St. Louis to Minneapolis. The men were riding in a farm wagon and failed to hear the approaching train as they attempted to cross the track.

**Physician Died on Way Home.**  
Dr. L. A. Todd, a member of St. Joseph board of health, died on an interurban car, en route from Kansas City to St. Joseph. He went to Kansas City in the afternoon to be treated for an affection of the ear and died near Camden Point on his way home. He was 45 years old.

**Woman, 75, Gets Divorce.**  
Mrs. Elizabeth Rider, 75 years old, obtained a divorce at Springfield recently. William Rider, 78, of Aurora, was the defendant. Mrs. Rider said they were married two years ago and were happy for nine months. Then she said, Rider wanted her to sell her property and they separated.

**Widow of Ex-Justice Dies.**  
News was received in St. Louis recently of the death in Greenville, Miss., of Mrs. Theodora W. Valliant, widow of Chief Justice Valliant of the Missouri supreme court, and a great granddaughter of President Zachary Taylor.

**Comrade of McKinley Dead.**  
John McGregor, who belonged to the same Ohio company of which President McKinley was a member during the Civil War, is dead at Hannibal. He was 81 years old.

## 14 SELECTED FOR M. U. AMBULANCE UNIT

\$2,133 Subscribed for Corps of Ambulance Drivers Who Will Go to France.

Fourteen men have qualified for service in the University of Missouri unit of the American Ambulance Field Service in France, twenty more are nearing the completion of the qualifying tests, and approximately forty are beginning them. The University of Missouri unit has been given the permission of the American Ambulance Field Service to send seventy-five instead of the original twenty-five at the same cost.

The men who have qualified are: Herbert English, Macon; F. C. Frick, Kansas City; J. S. Moss, Columbia; C. E. Kane, Maryville; B. G. Kline, Savannah; Donald Chapman, Chillicothe; George Gardner, Marlin, Texas; William K. Gardner, Jefferson City; A. S. Gregory, Columbia; Harry Kerr, Lathrop; J. P. Fletcher, Joplin; J. C. Farmer, Columbia; H. S. Bassett, St. Louis; and A. M. Hailey, Barry, Ill.

Two thousand one hundred and thirty-three dollars has been raised for the unit fund, the total of which must be \$9,375. Many of the University organizations are contributing to the fund by benefits. The business men and alumni of Joplin have contributed \$280. The alumni of Kansas City will contribute more than \$700 to the fund. Fourteen men entering the service have guaranteed their own expenses.

If the plan for organization and the raising of the fund is successful, the first unit of 25 men will sail from New York for Bordeaux on June 16, and the remaining fifty men on June 23.

The men who will go as the representatives of the University of Missouri, are from all parts of the state of Missouri and the unit will be the first representative body of Missourians to go on French soil.

## Rhubarb Easily Canned.

No vegetable can be canned more easily than rhubarb. The large amount of acid present as a preservative so that it will keep if put away in sterile water and sterile jars. There is little point in canning it in this way, however, for it must be cooked before being used. Furthermore, since it shrinks on cooking, it is a waste of space to can it raw. This is an important consideration this year especially when jars are so scarce.

Dr. Louise Stanley of the Missouri College of Agriculture offers the following suggestions for canning rhubarb:

Cut the rhubarb in half-inch lengths. Do not remove the outside layer since it cooks soft and its red color gives a very attractive pink tinge to the sauce. Pack in glass jars and add sugar in the same proportion as for sauce, about one-half by weight as much sugar as rhubarb. Put on a rack in any vessel large enough to allow the water to reach almost to the top of the jars. Let the water surrounding the jars boil fifteen minutes. Remove the jars. The contents will have shrunk considerably so that the contents of some jars may be used to fill the rest. Fill completely. Adjust rubbers, put on the tops loosely, return again to the water and boil five minutes. Remove and tighten covers while still boiling hot.

Another method equally successful is to put the rhubarb and sugar in a baking dish with a cover and bake until tender. Add no water for there is plenty in the rhubarb. When tender fill sterile jars with the mixture. Place jars in hot water bath and boil five minutes. Seal while hot.

Rhubarb may be canned successfully without sugar. In that case sugar must be added at the time the rhubarb is served.



## Can the Surplus Asparagus.

Does your asparagus bed produce more than you can eat? Then by all means can it, says Dr. Louise Stanley of the Missouri College of Agriculture. Its spring-like flavor will be enjoyed next winter.

Asparagus should be canned as soon as possible after gathering. This means that it may be necessary to can a few jars at one time but if asparagus is allowed to stand more than a few hours after being cut the delicate flavor is destroyed and it is more difficult to keep.

The stalks should be cleaned and any hard portions removed. They may be canned whole or cut into half inch pieces depending upon the form in which the vegetable is to be served. Pack into jars, cover with water, and add a teaspoonful of salt to each quart jar. Then adjust cover loosely, place in a water bath and boil two hours. Remove immediately and tighten the covers while they are hot.
